			Documents had been circulated prior to the meeting.
			On 28.11.2025, the General Manager had circulated KUSA's Annual Financial Statements (AFS) and Auditors' Report for the Year Ended 31.08.2025 to the Members of the Federal Council. The AFS were accompanied by two spreadsheets – <i>one</i> , the Income Statement with explanatory notes and, <i>two</i> , the Income Statement reflecting actuals vs budget. These documents were supplemented by the AFS of the various Provincial Councils and the FTLC.
			On 25.11.2025, pre-circulation to Fedco, the audited AFS and supporting documentation had been scrutinised by the Budget Committee. The members of the Budget Committee found no cause for concern and endorsed the veracity of the AFS and authorised their presentation to Fedco for approval.
			PM informed Fedco that this year's audit had been far more rigorous than in previous years. Having adopted a new auditing system, the Auditors deemed it necessary to do a total review of KUSA's accounting processes and demanded far more information from the KUSA Office than usual. Retrospectively, such intensive reviews seem to be a cyclical occurrence and, hopefully, for the next year or two, the organisation's financial disclosures would not be subjected to such exacting assessment.
			In the absence of any questions from the Federal Council, the Chairman moved for the adoption of the audited AFS. On a proposal from LT, seconded by MA , KUSA's Annual Financial Statements and Auditors' Report for the Year Ended 31.08.2025 were approved , unanimously .

	The Chairman read out an email from Brig Gen (retd.) NJ du Preez, dated 01.12.2025, in which he informs the Federal Council that he would no longer be available for appointment as the inhouse Legal Adviser of KUSA.

When required, the Chairman of the Federal Council shall appoint <i>two</i> (2) additional members of the Federal Council to consider any Appeal.]
	Appointment of all Provincial Council Chairmen of the Federal Council and the Vice-Chairman of DOGSPC to serve on the Appeals Committee, if and when appointed by the Chairman of the Federal Council.
	Having reminded Fedco of the customary procedure set out in the Note above, it was agreed, unanimously, that all Provincial Council Chairmen of the Federal Council and the Vice-Chairman of DOGSPC would be eligible to serve on the Fedco Appeals Committee (FAC), if and when two (2) members were so appointed by the Chairman of the Federal Council.

3.6 **K9 Administration Upgrade Project**

MA's Report on the K9 Administration Upgrade Project, prepared for Exco 11-2025, the essence of which had also been reported to Fedco at the Fedco Discussion Forum (FDF) Session 7 on 19.11.2025, had been shared with the Federal Council ahead of Fedco 12-2025. This Report was published on the KUSA website at the time of its release.

Supplementing MA's Report, a brief Project Status Report had been submitted by Srsbsns and also circulated to Fedco in advance of the meeting. While echoing much of what had been reported by MA, the Srsbsns Report sets out:

Next Steps:

- Complete all soft launch fixes and validations.
- Finalise backend workflows for admin efficiency (approvals, queues, notifications, etc.).
- Prepare and sanitise all data required for live membership onboarding.
- Conduct a final round of system verification before full release.

Timeline:

- Soft Launch: In progress
- Issue Resolution & Stabilisation: Ongoing through January–February
- Production Environment & Data Preparation: Underway
- Full Membership Adoption (Go-Live): End of March

Key considerations:

- Rapid turnaround of soft launch issues is essential to maintain the end-March rollout schedule.
- Any additional workflow changes requested during this phase may impact the timeline
- Data import accuracy and system performance under membership load will be key success factors.

Conclusion:

The project has transitioned successfully into the soft launch stage, marking a major milestone. With Priority 1 tasks complete and real-world testers in the system, we are now focused on stabilisation, workflow refinement, and preparing the production environment. The team remains on track for full membership adoption by the end of March, pending the resolution of issues raised in the soft launch period.

In his subsequent Report to Exco 12-2025, MA assessed the state of the project as follows:

"As of December, I am pleased to report that the KUSA Online Portal has entered a significant new phase. Following the progress outlined in previous updates, the system is now undergoing a soft launch.

At present, the KUSA staff are actively using the Portal and familiarising themselves with its functionality and workflows. This hands-on phase is an important step in ensuring that the KUSA Office is fully prepared to support members as they begin transitioning to the new system. As expected at this stage, a small number of minor issues and bugs have been identified, the developers are continuing to resolve. We eagerly await the completion of these fixes, which will allow staff to resume testing and further familiarise themselves with the system.

		In terms of rollout planning, member onboarding will commence in a phased manner from January. This approach allows for controlled onboarding rather than moving all members onto the system simultaneously, reducing risk and allowing lessons learned in early phases to be applied as the rollout progresses. The intention is that, by the end of March 2026, full member onboarding will be completed, and the system will be operating at full functional capacity in the production environment.
		Data migration into the production environment is nearing completion. The remaining work largely involves final verification and confirmation to ensure that all member data and historical records are correctly reflected before wider access is granted. Initial feedback on the migrated data has been positive, and we are awaiting final confirmation that all checks have been completed.
		The new payment gateway is now fully integrated and functioning within the Portal, removing one of the most significant risks identified earlier in the project. With payment processing stable and the overall system environment proving reliable under real-world use by the office, the project is well-positioned for the next phase of rollout.
		In summary, the project remains on track. December marks a transition from development and testing into controlled real-world use, with a clear and measured plan in place for full member onboarding in the new year. The focus for the coming months will be on supporting users, refining workflows based on real usage, and completing the transition to the new platform.
		We are entering 2026 with strong momentum and confidence in a successful rollout."
		PM thanked MA for his assistance and insights and for her being able to avail herself of his oversight over the past number of months. It had been particularly gratifying to her to be able to discuss the state of the project with somebody who was not only knowledgeable, but also had the knack of compiling progress reports which were within the grasp of the entire dog community.

		In August 2025, LT, MA, and PM met at the Stor-Age Unit to get a clearer understanding of what would be required for the disposal of the items stored in the unit. The scale and enormity of the task quickly dawned when the boxes containing Paintings/Prints, Trophies, Porcelain Figurines and Memorabilia were identified. The boxes were split into three and taken home to be opened, their contents photographed and catalogued, and returned the following week to be placed back into storage.
		Items considered suitable for display and of possible interest to the public were identified, catalogued and offered on a loan basis to the Dog Museum (www.museumofdogs.co.za), situated at 95 Keerom Street, Gardens, Cape Town. Numerous trophies, posters, Royal Doulton plates and paintings, that had previously been displayed in the Boardroom/Library at 68 Bree Street, have subsequently been put on display at the Dog Museum, all under a loan agreement drafted and signed by LT on behalf of KUSA.

		The emptying of the storage unit will need to be done in a phased manner, the next logical step being the disposal, either via sale or donation, of redundant furniture and equipment, such as metal shelving, metal cabinets, outdated desktop computers, wooden furniture, display cabinets, bookshelves, fridge, microwave oven, etc. There were obviously costs involved and quotations would need to be obtained for the removal and transport of some of the items. Apart from the items of historical or sentimental value still in storage that needed to be catalogued and, possibly, some added to the items already entrusted to the care of the Dog Museum, the fate of the furniture and appliances mentioned needed to be decided. Some views were aired, but MA's thought of perhaps auctioning the items off to members seemed to meet with general approval. The options would obviously be fully explored by LT, MA and PM in the new year and appropriate action taken to clear the storage unit of items surplus to requirement.
3.8		Protection of Personal Information Act (POPIA), No. 4 of 2013 (Fedco 12-2022 Item 3.8, Fedco 06-2023 Item 3.5, Fedco 12-2023 Item 3.8, Fedco 06-2024 Item 3.5, Fedco 12-2024 Item 3.8, Fedco 06-2025 Item 3.4, Fedco 07-2025 Item 3.2) Fedco 07-2025: The proposed Privacy Policy, marked up with certain edits by NR, was tabled for consideration by the Federal Council. The Chairman explained that, in drafting the Privacy Policy, she had relied heavily on the Privacy Policies of the Malaysian Kennel Club (MKC) and the Philippine Canine Club, Inc. (PCCI) and that, although she had assumed consent by the MKC and the PCCI, it was her intention to formally seek their agreement to the use of their content in KUSA's document.
		It was agreed that, apart from the two foreign Kennel Clubs' consent, the document should be thoroughly proofread before publication. Subject to the above, the adoption of the Privacy Policy and the allied spreadsheet, setting out the KUSA Forms and Guidelines impacted by the Privacy Policy, was approved, unanimously, on a proposal from MV, seconded by NR.
		Subsequent to Fedco 07-2025, in getting the document ready for publication, the Privacy Policy was subjected to an invasive edit by the KUSA Office, not so much to change content, but rather to assuage its style and tone and customise the envisaged privacy protection to KUSA's operations. The revised draft was circulated to members of the Federal Council in advance of Fedco 12-2025 for final scrutiny. NR identified a few additional typos and some areas requiring grammatical attention and MA indicated that, from a technical perspective, he might have a few further suggestions.
		It was agreed, unanimously, that PM, GR and MA should meet as soon as practicable to collaborate on a final version and that the KUSA Office should then proceed to publication at the earliest opportunity. It was confirmed that the proposer and seconder for the previous version of the Privacy Policy would hold for the revised version, i.e. proposer, MV and seconder, NR, with no objections.

	3.9.1	Proposed amendments to Schedule 07 – Subscription & Fees – to Provide for Concessionary Rates for Annual Affiliations Fees and Show Licence Fees for KUSA-affiliated Clubs based in Namibia
		Proposed by the FS&NCPC.
		Proposal:
		To amend the Schedule 07 Fees charged to KUSA-affiliated Clubs in Namibia which conduct their operations and hold their Shows under the Regulations of KUSA. By reducing Annual Affiliation Fees and Show Licence Fees of Namibian-based Clubs, it is believed that KUSA will make a critical contribution to the sustainability and survival of Clubs in Namibia and enable them to host more events and increase their public engagement. This proposal aligns with KUSA's objectives of encouraging canine activities not only in Namibia but, in time, also in other regional territories.
		Motivation: Item 3.6.4 (Note 3) from the Minutes of Fedco 06-2025 refers: Pursuant to the above discussion, RJ raised the possibility of concessionary Affiliation Fees for Namibian Clubs and, perhaps, in the future, other over-border Clubs. This was debated, during which PM argued that costs such as Show Licence Fees and Show Returns might also be considered when investigating how best to accommodate Clubs in Namibia financially.
		KUSA has long served as a beacon of canine excellence and governance across Southern Africa. Namibian-based Clubs rely on KUSA's internationally recognised framework to host events that meet high standards of professionalism and are fully committed to upholding KUSA's Regulations, Breed Standards and administrative processes.
		Current Challenges Clubs in Namibia face several logistical and financial challenges that impact their ability to host Shows, including:
		 Increased operational costs due to travel, accommodation and import requirements for international judges and exhibitors;
		 Limited sponsorship and exhibitor bases, resulting in reduced income from entry fees or support; and
		Border and regulatory complexities, which further increase the costs and viability of running events.
		A reduced fee structure would:

inserted, or deleted, it obviously triggers the renumbering of the rest of the clauses at that numbering level.

The primary purpose of the latest proposed amendments is to insert a further empowering clause under Powers, permitting the Provincial Council Chairmen to intervene, or delegate such intervention, when Clubs are relegated to "Ineligible Member Club" status in an effort to restore their good standing (Amendment 5). The rest of the amendments are of a housekeeping nature in the ongoing quest to improve the efficacy of Provincial Council Constitutions.

Amendment 1:

To insert a **new** sub-clause 4.1.3.2.3 under sub-clauses $4.1.3 \rightarrow 4.1.3.2$ of the Objectives to emphasise the necessity of Clubs complying with their Constitutions and Bylaws and for Standing Sub-Committees complying with the By-laws and Terms of Reference, as the case may be.

4.1.3.2.3 the compliance of Member Clubs with their constitutions and Standing Sub-Committees with their By-laws or Terms of Reference, as the case may be.

Amendment 2:

To insert the word "constituted" into clause 4.1.10 of the Objectives to make it clear that Provincial Councils' proposals may only be tabled at *constituted* meetings of Fedco.

4.1.10 To receive and consider proposals from Members of [INITIASLISM OF PROVINCIAL COUNCIL] on any issue, including proposals to amend the KUSA Constitution, or any Schedule thereof and, after due consideration, to approve (with or without amendment), or reject, any such proposal and to forward those approved to KUSA for tabling of at the next **constituted** meeting of the Federal Council.

Amendment 3:

To insert the words "and signed" into clause 4.1.18 of the Objectives to make it clear that the Provincial Councils' Audited Financial Statements must also be **signed** by the Auditor or Independent Financial Practitioner.

4.1.18 To provide KUSA with financial statements, audited <u>and signed</u> by the qualified auditor or Independent Financial Practitioner appointed in terms of Clause 16.1.11, before 30 November of each year.

Amendment 4:

To remove clause 5.1.1.1 from the list of Powers of the Provincial Councils, since the function of approving Clubs' shows has devolved on the KUSA Office.

[5.1.1.1 consider and approve, in the first instance (but always subject to KUSA's overriding right of confirmation, or otherwise), all applications made by Member Clubs of [INITIASLISM OF PROVINCIAL COUNCIL] for dates to hold conformation shows or

other events and, if it so chooses, to issue licences in respect of Non-Championship Shows;

Amendment 5:

To insert a new cause 5.1.4 under Powers which, in the case of maladministered Clubs, will permit the Chairman of the Provincial Council to petition the Executive Committee to authorise the Provincial Council Chairman to appoint a person vested with the powers to take such actions and implement such measures to restore the sound governance of the Club.

5.1.4 As an action of last resort, compel an Ineligible Member Club to remedy its constitutional breaches or governance failures by petitioning the Executive Committee to authorise the Chairman (of [INITIASLISM OF PROVINCIAL COUNCIL]) to appoint a person to act in the place of the Chairman of the Club, such person to be vested with the powers to take such actions and implement such measures to restore the sound governance of the Club and thereby the rescission of its Ineligible Member Club status.

Amendment 6:

To insert the words "and signed" into clause 16.1.4 under Annual General Meetings to make it clear that the Provincial Councils' Audited Financial Statements must also be **signed** by the Auditor or Independent Financial Practitioner.

16.1.4 At the Annual General Meeting, the Chairman shall report on the activities of [INITIASLISM OF PROVINCIAL COUNCIL] during the period since the last Annual General Meeting, and the Treasurer shall present the Financial Statements, audited and.signed by, at the very least, an Independent Financial Practitioner.

Amendment 7:

To insert the words "and signed" into clause 19.1 under Audited Financial Statements to make it clear that the Provincial Councils' Audited Financial Statements must also be **signed** by the Auditor or Independent Financial Practitioner.

19.1 [INITIASLISM OF PROVINCIAL COUNCIL] shall submit its books of account and financial records for annual audit to the auditor or Independent Financial Practitioner appointed at the Annual General Meeting by no later than the 30 September of each year and, following their approval at the Annual General Meeting, shall forward its audited and.signed accounts of income and expenditure and [INITIASLISM OF PROVINCIAL COUNCIL]'s Statement of Financial Position (balance sheet) to KUSA before 30 November of each year.

			The FAC considered the Grounds for Appeal seriatim and found, by majority vote:

			Ground 1: DSC's failure to consider or address relevant procedural issues raised by the
			appellant
			Having carefully looked at the procedural requirements of KUSA's Disciplinary Rules, and the
			process followed, the FAC was happy that due process had been followed. The FAC thus
			rejected this point as a reason for appeal, and declined to overturn the findings of the
			DSC on this Ground.
			Ground 2: DSC's failure to consider or address the appellant's version of events
			Following careful scrutiny of all documents before them, the FAC concluded that the Appellant
			was involved in falsely declaring a Dual Sire mating as a natural mating and had not applied
			his mind fully to the application documents being submitted to KUSA. Given that the late Mr
			DW Thompson was a mentor to the Appellant, it was reasonable to expect that the Appellant

would have used this opportunity more fully to improve his knowledge of procedures, which would have prevented the occurrence of this regrettable situation.

However, the DSC took into consideration that the Litter Registration Application – Breed Register had been signed by the late Mr DW Thompson and not by the Appellant. Moreover, while the application received by KUSA was sent from the Appellant's email address, it did not bear the Appellant's name or provide any evidence that it had been scrutinised by the Appellant. On a balance of probabilities, the FAC could not be fully certain of the role played by the Appellant and found this sufficient cause to uphold the Appeal. The FAC thus rejected the finding of the DSC on this Ground.

Ground 3: The DSC's errors of fact

The FAC noted the Appellant's misunderstanding the process of attending the DSC hearing but as this argument was not grounds for an Appeal, it was not considered further.

Ground 4: The penalties imposed on the appellant by the DSC

The FAC considered the penalties imposed by the DSC on the Appellant and looked at each in light of the decision made on Grounds 1, 2 and 3. The FAC thus ruled that:

Issue 1 – Matters relating to the Application for Registration of a Complete Litter resulting from an undeclared Dual Sire mating

- 1.1 In terms of Schedule 01 Rule 11.1.1, the Respondent is expelled from membership of KUSA for a period of ten (10) years, which penalty is suspended in full, provided that the Respondent is not found in breach of any Regulation as described in Schedule 02 or Schedule 03 during the period of suspension.
 - Given the FAC's finding based on Ground 2, **the FAC ruled that the decision be overturned in full**. However, the FAC would like to caution the Appellant that, as a member of KUSA, he is bound by the Rules and Regulations of the organisation and should make every effort to apply his mind in full to similar applications in the future.
- 1.2 In terms of Rule 11.1.2 of Schedule 01, the Respondent is excluded from acting as an Officer (Chairman, Vice-Chairman, Secretary or Treasurer) of a Club for a period of five (5) years.
 - Given the FAC's finding based on Ground 2, and the overturning of Penalty 1.1 above, the FAC ruled that the decision be overturned in full. However, the FAC would like to caution the Appellant that as a member of KUSA, and a representative of a Club, he is seen as a person in authority and should ensure that he sets a shining example for others and familiarises himself with the Rules and Regulations of the organisation, or at least becomes conversant with the location of such information, when required.
- 1.3 In terms of Schedule 01 Rule 11.1.5, the Respondent is disqualified from officiating as a Judge at any Show or event held under KUSA licence, or from officiating as a Judge at any Shows licensed by a National Canine Organisation (NCO) holding any category of membership or contract partnership of the FCI, or from officiating as a Judge in any non-FCI country at a Show or event held under the jurisdiction of an

NCO with which KUSA has arrangements of mutual recognition and reciprocity, **for a period of five (5) years.**

Given the FAC's finding based on Ground 2, and the overturning of Penalty 1.1 above, the FAC ruled that the decision be overturned in full.

1.4 In terms of Schedule 01 Rule 11.1.6, a fine in the amount of two thousand five hundred rands (R2,500.00) in part compensation of the costs KUSA had incurred in the course of its investigation and in rectification of the contamination of its Primary Breed Register, caused by the misconduct of the Respondent.

Given the FAC's finding based on Ground 2, and the overturning of Penalty 1.1 above, **the FAC ruled that the decision be overturned in full** and that the fine paid be refunded to the Appellant.

The rulings of the FAC in respect of 1.1 to 1.3 above shall become effective upon the date of signature of this Record of Proceedings and Minutes by the Chairman of the FAC.

8.1.2 Case 2024-04 – KUSA vs Botes

The Fedco Appeals Committee (FAC) heard the above case on Thursday, 17.07.2025, and the Minutes and Record of Proceedings reflect the following Finding, followed by the Penalties imposed on the Appellant:

FAC Finding:

In reaching its finding, the FAC not only took into account KUSA's obligations as a Registering Authority and Breeders' Society under the Animal Improvement Act, 62 of 1998, as contemplated in Article 1.2, but also its responsibility to give effect to its key object of functioning as a world-class Registering Authority and Breeders' Society for canines as a full member of the Fédération Cynologique Internationale (FCI).

In acquiring membership of KUSA on a voluntary basis, members subject themselves to KUSA's and the FCI's regulatory frameworks, as well as the statutory provisions of National legislation which apply to KUSA. In operating a Register which relies exclusively on trust and honesty for its veracity, there can be no tolerance by KUSA of deception and chicanery.

Considering the case in its totality, the FAC concluded that, on a balance of probabilities, there was sufficient evidence to uphold the finding of the DSC made on 13 February 2025, that the Appellant had wilfully compromised KUSA's Primary Breed Register by registering the offspring of a Rottweiler Dam imported in whelp as imports in flagrant contravention of the International Breeding Rules of the FCI, and doing so in circumvention and violation of Schedule 02 Appendix "C" Regulation 6.4 of the KUSA Constitution.

Penalties:

In setting the penalties, the FAC took into account that, unless otherwise proven in the future, the Appellant was a first offender but, given the premeditation with which the fraud on KUSA had been perpetrated, could find no mitigating circumstances to sway them to impose more lenient penalties on the Appellant. There is an expectation on the part of the KUSA membership and the broader purebred dog community that contraventions of this nature should not go unpenalised, and it's incumbent on the FAC to take the necessary steps to ensure, to whatever extent possible, that the Primary Breed Register was protected against contamination and, if brought into disrepute, that its integrity was restored.

From the evidence presented, the wanton violation of the KUSA Primary Breed Registry seemed to be a recurring problem, and it was the FAC's responsibility to impose penalties commensurate with the gravity of the offence perpetrated to serve as a deterrent to others

contemplating to indulge in similar covert activities. Moreover, it was the duty of the FAC to send, through its imposition of penalties, a clear message that such fraudulent activities would not be tolerated by KUSA.

Taking the above into account, the FAC considered the penalties imposed on the Appellant (erstwhile Respondent) by the DSC and **agreed**, **unanimously**, **to uphold the penalties imposed by the DSC**, i.e.:

- In terms of Schedule 01 Rule 11.1.1, the Appellant is expelled from membership of KUSA for a period of ten (10) years, which penalty is suspended in full, provided that the Respondent is not found in breach of any Regulation as described in Schedule 02 during the period of suspension.
- In terms of Rule 11.1.2 of Schedule 01, the Appellant is excluded from acting as an Officer of a Club (Chairman, Vice-Chairman, Secretary or Treasurer) for a period of five (5) years.
- In terms of Schedule 01 Rule 11.1.3, the Appellant is disqualified from registration, recording, exhibition or evaluation of a dog owned by him or registered or recorded in his name, or jointly with another or others, or in the name of a nominee, or of the progeny of such a dog, for a period of five (5) years. The Respondent may, however, transfer dogs during this period.
- In terms of Schedule 01 Rule 11.1.5, the Appellant is disqualified from taking part in the management of any Show or event held under KUSA licence or licensed by a National Canine Organisation (NCO) holding any category of membership or contract partnership with the FCI, or officiating in any non-FCI country at a Show or event held under the jurisdiction of an NCO with which KUSA has arrangements of mutual recognition and reciprocity for a period of five (5) years. This includes acting as a Helper.
- In terms of Schedule 01 Rule 11.1.6, a fine in the amount of two thousand rands (R2,000.00) per puppy is imposed in part compensation for the costs KUSA has incurred to date in relation to this case. This excludes the KUSA fee relating to possible amendments to the Certificates of Registration issued for the six (6) puppies.

In terms of Schedule 01 Rule 12.13.3, read with Rule 11.1.4; and Rule 11.1.8, read with Schedule 03 Regulation 33.2, the FAC imposed the following **additional Penalties**:

- 7 The **removal of the 'Imported' status** of the six dogs comprising the C-litter.
- The withdrawal of any awards made to those dogs at any KUSA-licensed Show or Event and the withdrawal of all KUSA titles earned by them.
- 9 The **cancellation of the registrations of the C-litter dogs** in terms of Schedule 02 Regulation 12.1.

Similarly, the **cancellation of the registrations of any offspring of the C-litter**, whether produced by any C-litter Dam, or by one of the C-litter Sires to another Dam, and informing the Registered Owners of all the implicated dogs (C-litter and their offspring) of the cancellations and the reason(s) therefor.

Noted.

8.1.3 Case 2024-05 – KUSA (Austen & NFSKC) vs Pieterse, Van den Doel & Katts

The Disciplinary Sub-Committee (DSC) heard the above case on Friday, 16.03.2025, and the Minutes and Record of Proceedings reflect the following Finding, followed by the Penalties imposed on the Respondents:

DSC Finding:

After careful consideration of all the submitted evidence, documents, still images, video clip and affidavits, the DSC unanimously reached the following decision, on a balance of probabilities, with regard to Case 2024-05 before them **that the complaint against the Respondents was fully substantiated by the presented evidence** in that the Respondents had acted in a manner that was improper, disorderly, disrespectful, and damaging to the reputation of KUSA.

Penalties:

Taking into consideration the nature of the misconduct, and the fact that they were first offenders, the DSC imposed the following penalty on each of the three (3) Respondents:

In terms of Rule 11.1.7 of Schedule 09, the Respondents are each hereby reprimanded and warned regarding the above contravention of Schedule 03 and 09 as outlined in this document.

No Notice of Appeal was given by any of the Respondents.

8.1.4 Case 2025-01 – Olivier vs Fyfe

The Disciplinary Sub-Committee (DSC) heard the above case on Thursday, 28.10.2025, and the Minutes and Record of Proceedings reflect the following Finding, followed by the Penalties imposed on the Respondent:

Finding:

The DSC thoroughly perused the documentation before them to determine whether the Respondent had indeed infringed the two main points of the complaint. In particular, they noted the various photographs of the dog in question, and the comments made by the Complainant, the Respondent, the breeder of the dog and other members of dogdom and broader society. These were weighed and assessed, on a balance of probabilities, to determine whether or not the Respondent had indeed infringed the Rules and Regulations she allegedly breached.

The DSC further noted that cyber-bullying was becoming more prevalent within dogdom and had the potential to discredit the sport and damage the credibility of those involved in dogshowing, whether they were competing as exhibitors, officiating as Judges, or acting in the capacity of Show Officials. This, in turn, tarnishes the image of KUSA and its licensed activities, purebred dogs, and KUSA membership in the eyes of the general public.

It had been brought to the attention of the DSC that an application for KUSA membership had been received from the Respondent's husband on 16 June 2025, which was duly processed on 18 June 2025. On 20 June 2025, the KUSA Office received and processed an application from the Respondent to transfer five (5) of her dogs into her husband's name after disciplinary action had been instituted against her by the Complainant.

Taking the Respondent's alleged transgressions of KUSA Regulations and Codes into account, compounded by the pre-emptive transfers of dogs, ostensibly to avoid the imposition of sanctions against them in an anticipated guilty finding, and in consideration of the papers, screenshots and other evidence entered into the record of this Case 2025-01, the DSC found, unanimously, and on a balance of probabilities, **that the complaint had been fully**

		substantiated by the Complainant.

Since the United States of America is the country of origin of the Boston Terrier, it should stand to reason that the FCI Breed Standard is the preferable option.

As further prescribed by the *KUSA Protocol for Adopting Breed Standards*, KUSA extracted a list of Breeders of Boston Terriers who had registered litters during the past seven (7) years, as well as a list of persons who had taken transfer of one or more Boston Terriers into their Registered Ownership during the same seven-year period. From these lists, non-members were eliminated, since they were not eligible to participate in any poll conducted by KUSA.

On 01.10.2025, the KUSA Secretary wrote to the Breeders and Registered Owners who met the survey criteria – seven (7) in total – fully motivating the proposed conversion to the FCI Breed Standard, also providing a comparative analysis of the two Breed Standards compiled by the KUSA Office, comparison of the coat colours allowed under the respective Breed

Standards, as well as links to both Breed Standards. The survey participants were sent Voting Forms with a return deadline of 14.10.2025

Three (3) of the seven respondents returned Voting Forms in favour of conversion and four (4) votes in favour of conversion were therefore acquired by acquiescence, which fallback position was clearly set in the referendum conditions as a consequence of failure to respond.

In view of the above, a majority vote in favour of adopting the FCI Breed Standard under the nomenclature of **Boston Terrier** was achieved.

For ratification and adoption.

On a **proposal from MV**, **seconded by JH**, the result of the referendum was **ratified**, **unanimously**, and the adoption of the FCI Breed Standard for the **Skye Terrier** was **approved**, **unanimously**.

In November 2025, at the request of the Breed Standards Committee, the KUSA Office issued a referendum, as prescribed by the *KUSA Protocol for Adopting Breed Standards*, to convert KUSA's current Breed Standard for the Lhasa Apso, that of The Royal Kennel Club, UK, to the FCI's county-of-patronage Breed Standard, based on that of The Royal Kennel Club.

As further prescribed by the *KUSA Protocol for Adopting Breed Standards*, KUSA extracted a list of Breeders of Lhasa Apsos who had registered litters during the past seven (7) years, as well as a list of persons who had taken transfer of one or more Lhasa Apsos into their Registered Ownership during the same seven-year period. From these lists, non-members were eliminated, since they were not eligible to participate in any poll conducted by KUSA.

On 21.11.2025, the KUSA Secretary wrote to the Breeders and Registered Owners who met the survey criteria – four (4) in total – fully motivating the proposed conversion to the FCI Breed Standard, also providing a comparative analysis of the two Breed Standards compiled by the KUSA Office. The survey participants were sent Voting Forms with a return deadline of 28.11.2025

None of the four respondents returned the Voting Form and a vote of four (4) in favour of the conversion was therefore acquired by acquiescence, which fallback position was clearly set in the referendum conditions as a consequence of failure to respond.

In view of the above, a majority vote in favour of adopting the FCI Breed Standard under the nomenclature of **Lhasa Apso** was achieved.

For ratification and adoption.

On a **proposal from MV**, **seconded by JH**, the result of the referendum was **ratified**, **unanimously**, and the adoption of the FCI Breed Standard for the **Lhasa Apso** was **approved**, **unanimously**.

Effective 01.01.2026.

WORKING GROUP

Mastiff

In November 2025, at the request of the Breed Standards Committee, the KUSA Office issued a referendum, as prescribed by the *KUSA Protocol for Adopting Breed Standards*, to convert KUSA's current Breed Standard for the Mastiff, that of The Royal Kennel Club, UK, to the FCI's county-of-origin Breed Standard.

As further prescribed by the **KUSA Protocol for Adopting Breed Standards**, KUSA extracted a list of Breeders of Mastiffs who had registered litters during the past seven (7) years, as well as a list of persons who had taken transfer of one or more Mastiffs into their Registered Ownership during the same seven-year period. From these lists, non-members were eliminated, since they were not eligible to participate in any poll conducted by KUSA.

On 21.11.2025, the KUSA Secretary wrote to the Breeders and Registered Owners who met the survey criteria – two (2) in total – fully motivating the proposed conversion to the FCI Breed Standard, also providing a comparative analysis of the two Breed Standards compiled by the KUSA Office. The survey participants were sent Voting Forms with a return deadline of 28.11.2025

One (1) of the two respondents returned the Voting Form in favour of conversion and one (1) vote in favour of conversion was therefore acquired by acquiescence, which fallback position was clearly set in the referendum conditions as a consequence of failure to respond.

In view of the above, a majority vote in favour of adopting the FCI Breed Standard under the nomenclature of **Mastiff** was achieved.

For ratification and adoption.

On a **proposal from NR**, **seconded by MV**, the result of the referendum was **ratified**, **unanimously**, and the adoption of the FCI Breed Standard for the **Mastiff** was **approved**, **unanimously**.

Effective 01.01.2026.

9.1.5 Adoption of FCI Breed Standards for breeds without registration activity in the Kennel Union for the past seven (7) years

Proposal to convert the Breed Standards of breeds with no recorded registration history for the past seven years from RKC (UK) Breed Standards to FCI Breed Standards

Submitted by the Breed Standards Committee and brought forward by the Chairman.

Proposal & Motivation:

With the assistance of the KUSA Office, the Breed Standard Committee has identified four (4) breeds with no recorded history of registrations for at least the past seven (7) years. In keeping with KUSA's commitment to the FCI to incrementally adopt its Nomenclature and Breed Standards over an undetermined period, the Breed Standards Committee believes that adopting FCI Breed Standards for breeds that are seldom, if ever, imported into South Africa, or had declined in popularity to the point of obscurity, goes some way towards demonstrating KUSA's goodwill and its ongoing efforts to achieve conversions whenever possible.

During the previous conversions of this kind, seven (7) years of non-activity was deemed as a fair benchmark for the conversion of Breed Standards of breeds which no longer (or have never) enjoyed popularity in South Africa. Without the need for referenda, these seamless conversions are nonprejudicial to KUSA members but, importantly, bear testimony to KUSA's bona fides towards the FCI.

Proposal:

Current KUSA regulations provide for dispensation to be granted by the Executive Committee for a Championship Show to be held outside the Centre in which the Show-holding Club is domiciled. However, to the best of our knowledge, such a dispensation has either rarely, or never, been granted.

This creates a practical limitation for Specialist Breed Clubs, where only one such Club for a particular Breed is affiliated to KUSA within Southern Africa. Exhibitors and enthusiasts of these Breeds are often spread across multiple Provinces and the restriction to the Club's domiciled Province limits accessibility and broader participation in such events. The Committees of such Clubs are often comprised of members from all over the country.

In view of the above, it is proposed that an amendment be made to Schedule 03 Regulation 2.1 to allow greater flexibility for standalone Specialist Breed Clubs. In cases where only one Specialist Club for a particular Breed is affiliated to KUSA, we request that such Clubs be permitted to host their annual Championship Shows in Provinces other than the one in which they are domiciled. This would better facilitate participation by exhibitors of the said Breed residing in different Provinces and promote inclusivity and national Breed development.

Motivation:

- Specialist Breed Clubs often serve a geographically dispersed membership base;
- Restricting Championship Shows to the domiciled Province limits access for exhibitors in other regions;
- Moving the Show to different Centres would distribute the burden on long-distance travel more evenly among exhibitors;
- This amendment would encourage greater participation, support equitable access and contribute to the advancement of Breeds across the country and promote inclusivity and accessibility for exhibitors located in other Provinces;
- This flexibility would align KUSA's mission to promote and advance purebred dogs across all regions of Southern Africa; and
- Any application to hold the Show in a different Centre would still be subject to Exco scrutiny and approval.

It is not envisaged that the option of "lending licences" would be a suitable solution, as an affiliated Group or All-breeds Club could not lend a licence to a Breed Specialist Club, since these Clubs are bound by their own Constitutions, as well as the KUSA Articles, to host Shows for all Breeds.

Proposed amendments to Schedule 03 Regulation 2.1:

Proposal:

Current regulations prohibit Judges who are exhibiting dogs at Championship and Non-championship Shows from judging any Breed or Dogsport Class at the same or other event on the same day at the same venue, including Junior Showmanship. The intent behind this rule is to preserve impartiality and avoid conflicts of interest in Breed and Dogsport judging. However, this restriction unduly limits the availability of qualified Judges for Junior Showmanship, a competition in which the *handling skills* of young exhibitors are assessed, not the quality of the dogs presented. Junior Showmanship constitutes a distinct discipline from Breed and Dogsport judging and, therefore, does not pose a conflict of interest.

1. Distinct Purpose and Criteria:

Junior Showmanship judging evaluates the presentation, handling ability, knowledge and sportsmanship of the Child and/or Junior Handlers. The quality, breed or conformation of the exhibit is not part of the assessment criteria. This is fundamentally different from Breed and Dogsport judging, where the exhibit itself, and its quality, is the focus of evaluation/assessment.

2. Reduced Risk of Conflict of Interest:

Since Junior Showmanship does not involve evaluating dogs for breeding merit or awards toward titles, the concern regarding potential favouritism toward certain kennels, breeders or exhibits is significantly diminished.

3. Increased Availability of Qualified Judges:

	 Many qualified Junior Showmanship Judges are often also active exhibitors and the current restrictive Regulations exclude these skilled professionals from exhibiting, if they choose to judge, or from judging, if they choose to exhibit. Allowing them to judge Junior Showmanship, as well as exhibit in Breed and compete in Dogsport, would increase the pool of qualified officials, thereby helping to support the development of young Handlers as well as supporting Clubs. 4. Support for Youth Development: Junior Showmanship is a foundational programme for introducing young people to Breed and Dogsport and nurturing their development. Expanding the available judging pool enhances educational opportunities and provides juniors with access to a broader range of experienced mentors and evaluators.
	The current regulations severely restrict Clubs from offering Junior Showmanship Classes, especially in situations where no other Judge on the panel is qualified to officiate for Junior Showmanship. Clubs are losing out on either entry fees, where a Judge is prohibited from exhibiting in any Breed Class, or competing in any Dogsport Class, or on the opportunity of offering Junior Showmanship Classes if Judges cannot be contracted.

time to afford them the opportunity to get the Sub-Committees in place in time for their AGMs to be held before the end of October. Early August would, conceivably, be the appropriate time for the despatch of the letters.

With all in **agreement**, the Chairman requested NR to also draft proposed **Bylaws for the Provincial Council Sub-Committees for Junior Showmanship**, which she undertook to do in consultation with PM and JH.

Fedco 12-2025 Junior Showmanship – National Initiative Progress Report by Nikki Redtenbacher – Fedco Junior Showmanship Portfolio-holder

In alignment with the broader strategic framework for the development of Junior Showmanship programmes countrywide and given the dormancy of the FCI's Non-mandatory Commission for Youth and the subsequent withdrawal of KUSA's Representative to this Youth Commission, it was resolved, at Fedco 06-2025, to establish Provincial Sub-Committees under each Provincial Council, with the long-term objective of forming a National Junior Showmanship Sub-Committee. This initiative aims to elevate the pre-eminence and visibility of Junior Showmanship on a National platform, advocates for the skills development of Junior Handlers as well as strengthening regional representation, standardising youth engagement and ensuring continuity in national-level coordination and development. The implementation timeline was initially projected for end-2025, to ensure seamless transition and onboarding in time for the 2026 year.

As of beginning September 2025, the implementation of the Provincial Sub-Committees was delayed. The delay has also consequently affected the proposed timeline for the National Sub-Committee formation and handover, now projected for the first half of 2026.

Key contributing factors to the delay include:

- Early Scheduling of Provincial AGMs: Several Provincial Councils held their Annual General Meetings significantly earlier in 2025 than in previous years. This severely limited the available time within which to draft the required documentation and left limited opportunity for the proper nomination, vetting and endorsement of members to the Junior Showmanship Sub-Committees within the current governance cycle.
- Quadrennial Term Conclusion:

The current National Sub-Committee quadrennial term concludes on 31 December, 2025. Given the overlap of this term, coupled with the much earlier Provincial Council AGM dates, it was determined, in consultation with the KUSA Secretary and General Manager, that it would be both practical and administratively sound to align new Sub-Committee formation with the start of the next four-year term (beginning January 2026). It was also confirmed that the formation of, initially, Ad-hoc Sub-Committees in the respective Provinces by Provincial Councils does not need to take place at their AGMs and that this could be launched and implemented at any Ordinary Meeting of the respective Provincial Councils.

Motivation:

There have been complaints about certain Handlers entering NFC prior to the Show and then, after walking the course, or even halfway through the Class, they suddenly change to competitive, but they are last on the draw order every time.

One may change from NFC to "for competition" before any course-building takes place, so as soon as the first course-building takes place for Contact that's the cut-off, regardless of the grade. The same will apply to Non-Contact. Handlers can change from 'for competition' to NFC prior to the start of each Grade.

- 6.6 NOT FOR COMPETITION (NFC)
- 6.6.1 Handlers may enter their dogs as 'Not for Competition' (NFC) at any KUSA Show (refer to Regulations 6.1 and 6.6.4).

Currently, there are no guidelines for a Judge if there is any contravention of the Regulation. It doesn't define/stipulate what concealment is, nor what the consequences will be for different incidents/scenarios that may occur due to a Handler carrying an item on their person. This unfairly places the Judge in a very difficult position to make a decision not covered in the Regulations and this results in the

	rule being applied inconsistently between Judges around the country, further frustrating Handlers. Handlers have requested clarification on this regulation.

Proposal 1:

Pursuing a workable and functional solution.

The AWCWG has been dysfunctional for a while with only one or two representatives carrying out the responsibilities. The general feeling is that having one person from each province, plus Boland, does not work as not everyone has a vested interest in the AWC event or Team. Therefore, they do not assist with fundraising or many of the other responsibilities of the AWCWG.

The suggestion is to have 2-3 people, as well as the Agility Treasurer, who can facilitate the admin before the AWC Trials and the Team is selected. These appointments are regardless of Provincial Council but rather selected based on interest and intent. Those Handlers who have an interest in going to AWC should be encouraged to start fundraising activities prior to the Team selection and this responsibility doesn't lie with the AWCWG solely. This Working Group can then 'report' back to the NAgSC.

- 3.1.[3] 2 The AWCWG shall elect a Chairman who will be responsible to liaise with and report to the NAgSC within the terms of reference issued by the NAgSC (refer to Regulation 3.2.1) and supplemented by the terms of reference as per Schedule 05(L) Appendices A. C and D.
- 3.1.3 The AWCWG shall serve for a period of one (1) year following appointment.

Proposed amendments to 05L App D Terminology, Regulations 3.4.2, 3.7.2, 4.4.2, 4.5, 4.8

Proposal 1:

Ensure impartiality and fairness.

It is important that the running order does not favour or discriminate against any one height category. It could be more favourable for the height category that starts first during the summer months due to the heat and humidity experienced in some provinces. By rotating the height category so that each one starts first and finishes last, is fair for all Handlers and dogs.

- 3.4.2 Requirements for the Courses
- 3.4.2.1 Each Trial of the KUSA SAAC Regional Trials must have a Contact Agility and Non-Contact Agility Grade 3 course that must be jumped on the same day. Each round must cater for each height category and the running order must be interchanged so that each height category has a turn to start a round first and finish last. This must be different for the Contact Agility and Non-Contact Agility rounds jumped on the same day. The running order must be published prior to the start of the KUSA SAAC Regional Trials. The National Trials Co-ordinator will determine the order and, after obtaining approval from the AWCWG, publish it prior to the start of the first Trial.

Proposal 2:

Housekeeping amendment for clarification

There has been some confusion as to who must set the Standard Course Time for Grade 1 and Grade 2 if the SAAC Regional Trials are run under a League Licence. This is done by the Judge on the day if the round is run in conjunction with a show.

- 3.7 Qualifications
- 3.7.2 If the KUSA SAAC Regional Trials are held under an Agility League Licence, the Judge on the day will determine the SCT for Grade 1 and Grade 2 as per Regulation 3.7.1.

Proposal 3:

Tighten the course time.

The top dogs in the country should not be competing for the SAAC title using the minimum standard course time of 3.8m/s for Contact and 4.2m/s for Non-Contact. It is felt that the 20% would make it more inclusive so that dogs running at 5.4m/s don't receive time faults when a fast dog sets an outrageous time. For example, in Round 5 Large of the 2025 SAAC, only 4 dogs out of 11 would have been clear under the 15% Rule, whereas 6 out of 11 would have been under the 20% Rule with the rest having time faults. SA doesn't have the depth yet to just implement European standards and don't want numbers to shrink. It is essential that entrants don't become demotivated so that they want to keep entering SAAC and this keep the support pool for our top Handlers going to AWC.

- 4.4.2 Timing for KUSA SAAC
- 4.4.2.1 For each KUSA SAAC round, [the set time in metres per second for Grade 3 will be used to determine the SCT for each height category as per Schedule 05(L) Regulation 12.1.1.1.] the SCT (in seconds) will be determined by the time of the fastest dog, in each height category, with the fewest course faults + 20%, rounded up to the nearest second.

4.4.2.2 To ensure the minimum speed for Grade 3 is still achieved in Contact Agility and Non-Contact Agility, the course must be measured and the time of the fastest dog with fewest course faults will be used to check if the minimum speed stated in the table as per Schedule 05(L) Regulation 12.1.1.1 has been attained. If the minimum speed is not attained, no Qualifications may be issued to Grade 1 or Grade 2 dogs (refer to Regulation 4.7.2). Proposal 4: Ensure impartiality and fairness. It is important that the running order does not favour or discriminate against any one height category. It could be less favourable for the height category that starts first during the SAAC in June due to the dew or frost factor in some provinces. By rotating the height category so that each one starts first and finishes last, is fair for all Handlers and dogs. 4.5 KUSA SAAC COMPETITION 4.5.1 All dogs will jump the same courses, with the obstacles set at the heights/specifications prescribed for each height category (refer to Regulation 3.4.2.3). For each SAAC round, the running order must be interchanged so that all height categories, in rotation, have the opportunity to start the round first and finish last. Proposal 5: Housekeeping amendment for clarification. It has happened a few times in recent years that dogs that haven't qualified for SAAC but have entered for AWC trials have been on the podium which means that dogs who have qualified have missed out. The majority vote is that only the dogs that have qualified for the SAAC should be considered for the prizes of the rounds. 4.8 **AWARDS** 4.8.1 Only dogs that have qualified for the SAAC will be eligible for prizes in the four KUSA SAAC rounds as well as the overall prizes and title. Proposal:

Broaden the scope for Judges

Since the idea behind the National Agility League is to raise funds for the KUSA AWC Team, it is important to encourage as many Handlers as possible to enter to maximise incomes.

In the smaller provinces, the majority of the Judges are also active Handlers and there maybe one or two non-competitive Judges, if any. The top 5 dogs in the NAL automatically qualify for SAAC and don't have to compete in the SAAC Trials. So, with Judges not gaining points for those rounds that they judge, they don't want to judge as feel that they are adversely disadvantaged compared to other Handlers who gain points for each round. This means that judging is left to only non-competitive Judges or Judges not entering NAL, and if there is no Judge, NAL may not be held.

The proposed change still complies with Schedule 05(L) Regulation 6.8, in that the Judge is not competing in the Show, just towards League points.

Reasons

- It will not unfairly benefit the Judge to be allowed to run;
- The Judge has not seen the course before it is set up the morning of the round, therefore, they have no better understanding of its handling than any of the other competitors:
- If they run their dog(s) first, then they also will not have had the unfair opportunity to observe the traps that catch other Handlers and dogs.

8. Judging

- 8.1 The Judge for each round/competition must be a current/active KUSA Championship Show Agility Judge and in good standing with KUSA. He must be appointed or approved by the relevant Provincial Council Agility Sub-Committee [and may not enter or handle any dog in the same round/competition as he judges (refer to Schedule 5(L) Regulation 6.8)].
- 8.2 The appointed Judge may enter his dog(s) and take part on the day for the sole purpose of obtaining NAL points. On application for the Show or Trial Licence, the Provincial Council Agility Sub-Committee must appoint an alternate Judge, who is a KUSA-licensed Championship Show Agility Judge, to judge the rounds of the appointed Judge. Neither Judge may see the course ahead of time.
- 8.3 Should the appointed Judge have entered dog(s), he will be required to run all his dog(s), regardless of height category, prior to the commencement of the Event.
- 8.4 The Judge's dog(s) may not receive qualifications or prizes and the criteria as per Schedule 05(L) Regulation 6.8.2 are adhered to.
- [8.2]8.5 All rounds shall be judged as laid down in Schedule 05(L) Regulations 10 and 13 as well as the FCI Agility Judging Guidelines (Schedule 05(L) Appendix H).

On a **proposal from CC**, **seconded by MV**, the above amendments to Schedule 05L App F – Regulations for the KUSA National Agility League – were **approved**, **unanimously**.

		Proposal 1: 2.1: In line with Schedule 03 that permits a Club to host a maximum of two (2) Championship Shows per annum;
		New 2.3 and 2.4 - Clubs hosting Flyball under their Show licences are becoming fewer and it is up to the Flyball Sub-Committees to ensure there are sufficient number of Shows throughout the year to satisfy the needs of competitors. This is also in line with the Agility Schedule 05L.
		The existing 2.4 is a repeat of section 13 and will be combined with that section (see proposal 11).
		2. SCOPE OF LICENCE:

Proposal 2:

Regulation 3 – ELIGIBILITY OF DOGS FOR COMPETITION, subsection 3.4 and combining a portion of section 10.3 Interference with competitors (first paragraph).

The first paragraph of Regulation 10.3 refers to uncontrollable behaviour (which is to be combined with 9.6) as well as a dog that is unfit to compete. This fits in better with 3.4.4 of dogs that are ineligible to compete. It does not refer to interference. Also refer to the amendment of section 9.6 "Misbehaviour of dogs at a Show" (referenced under #5 below).

- 3. Eligibility of dogs for competition
- 3.4 The following dogs are ineligible to enter Flyball competitions:
- 3.4.1 Pregnant bitches.
- 3.4.2 Lactating bitches.
- 3.4.3 Bitches in heat.
- 3.4.4 Dogs that are apparently ill or hurt. The Judge may expel from competition any dog which he considers unfit or physically unable to compete. In the case of doubt, an official Veterinarian shall be called to give his opinion, but the Judge's decision is final.

Proposal 3:

Remove Regulation 5.1.1.1 under Flyball Classes

Motivation: A Team may substitute dogs after a heat or race not only when there is an injury. This rule was not amended at the time of changing Teams to 6 dogs and deleting reserve dogs.

- 5.1 Team Event Competition Class
- 5.1.1.1 A minimum of four (4) dogs and a maximum of six (6) [6] dogs per T[t]eam.
- Every dog in the <u>T[t]</u>eam (minimum 4, maximum 6 dogs) must be declared PRIOR to the first race of the competition. Once a competition has begun, there will be no changes to any <u>T[t]</u>eam.
- Each <u>T[t]</u>eam must have four (4) dogs running in each heat. [The other two (2) dogs may be substituted at the team's discretion or in the case of injury.]

Proposal 4:

Remove Regulation 5.2, 5.3 and 5.4 – Flyball Classes

Motivation: As dogs do not qualify or earn points in these Classes, these sections should be removed from the official Flyball Schedule 05M. These Classes were initially added to the Schedule to promote and attract potential Handlers to the sport. KUSA advised that dogs must be registered, and this was not the intention of these Classes initially – these were to give Handlers and new dogs a starting point and for dogs not ready to compete in Teams, the opportunity to experience the Show environment. It was never intended for KUSA-registered dogs and should any Non-championship Shows host these, it will be run similarly to that of "Elementary Beginners" in Obedience.

5. Flyball Classes

- [5.2 Single races:
- 5.2.1 A Single race consists of the following:
- 5.2.1.1 One dog and one handler.
- 5.2.1.2 A Box Loader.
- 5.2.2 This class may be run before or after the team event competition, as per the presiding judge's decision.
- 5.2.3 This class is not eligible for points and titles as per regulation 7 of this schedule.
- 5.2.4 The rules of running (regulation 12 of this schedule) will be observed except that:
- 5.2.4.1 The handler shall choose their desired jump height (Regulation 6.2 of this schedule).
- 5.2.4.2 Dogs will race other dogs or be run individually. Handlers are required to indicate in advance whether their dog/s will run against others or not.
- 5.2.4.3 Each dog will be given one race with three heats to set their best possible time.
- 5.2.4.4 Dogs will be ranked by fastest time.
- 5.2.4.5 Infractions will not be re-run and will result in a 'did not finish' (DNF) with no recorded time.
- 5.2.4.6 The heat is not awarded a win, loss or tie; only the time is recorded on the score sheet.
- 5.2.4.7 The fastest time of the dog for that show will be tracked by each province.
- 5.2.4.8 A singles dog that has participated in the singles class in at least ten (10) separate shows in a calendar year and has successfully completed at least one heat at each of those competitions will be awarded a singles certificate and rewarded the title of Flyball Single Dog Racer e.g. Flyball Single Dog Racer 2008. The certificate will be issued by the Provincial Flyball Subcommittee.

The design of the certificate will be at the provinces discretion.

- 5.3 Pairs races:
- 5.3.1 A Pairs race consists of the following:
- 5.3.1.1 Two dogs and two handlers.
- 5.3.1.2 A Box Loader.
- 5.3.2 This class may be run before or after team event competition, as per the judge's decision.
- 5.3.3 This class is not eligible for titles as per regulation 7 of this schedule.
- 5.3.4 The rules of running (regulation 12 of schedule) will be observed except that:
- 5.3.4.1 Pair's team shall choose their desired jump height (Regulation 6.2 of this schedule).
- 5.3.4.2 Pair's teams shall race other teams.
- 5.3.4.3 Each team will be given one race with three heats to set their best possible time.
- 5.3.4.4 Pairs teams will be ranked by fastest time.
- 5.3.4.5 Infractions will not be re-run and will result in a 'did not finish' (DNF) with no recorded time.
- 5.3.4.6 The heat is not awarded a win, loss or tie, only the time is recorded on the score sheet.
- 5.3.4.7 The fastest time of the pair for that show will be tracked by each province.
- 5.3.4.8 A dog that has participated in a pairs class, in any combination with any other dog, in at least ten (10) separate shows in a calendar year and has successfully completed at least one heat at each of those competitions will be awarded a pairs certificate and rewarded the title of Flyball Pairs Dog Racer e.g. Flyball Pairs Dog Racer 2008. The certificate will be issued by the Provincial Flyball Sub-committee. The design of the certificate will be at the provinces discretion.
- 5.3.4.9 No dog will be required to remain in any one (1) Pairs Team to obtain their points and Pairs Title.
- 5.4 Beginners Team class
- 5.4.1 This Class may be run before or after the team event competition, as per the presiding judge's decision.
- 5.4.2 A Beginners Team will only be able to enter Non-championship Shows and will consist of at least four (4) dogs in any combination including a maximum of two (2) experienced dogs.

- 5.4.3 A box loader / ball holder
- 5.4.4 Hurdle heights will be at 20cm
- 5.4.5 Beginner Teams are not eligible for any points, titles or prizes as per Regulation 7 of this Schedule
- 5.4.6 Times will not be recorded officially but may be used by teams to record team times on their own record sheet.
- 5.4.7 Heats will not be awarded a win or loss or tie.
- 5.4.8 Handlers may run with their dogs or elect a runner to run alongside their dogs to encourage the dog to run to the box / trainer box to pick up the ball
- 5.4.9 Props (i.e. lift jumps, striders and barriers etc. may be used freely)
- 5.4.10 Each team will be given two (2) races with a maximum of three (3) heats per race.]

Proposal 5:

Combine Schedule 05M section 9.6 Misbehaviour of dogs at a Show and sections of the first paragraph of 10.3 Interference with Competitors.

Motivation: Rename 9.6 to Misbehaviour of dogs and Handlers at a Show. Remove the first paragraph of 10.3 as it refers to misbehaviour / uncontrollable behaviour rather than interference. The remaining section of 10.3 to remain.

9.6 Misbehaviour of dogs and Handlers at a S[s]how:

[Physical disciplining of a dog or s]Serious uncontrollable behaviour of a dog at a Flyball competition may be penalised, at the discretion of the Flyball Judge, by excluding the dog [and/or handler] from further competition at the S[s]how and by ordering the exhibitor of the dog to forfeit any positions or points gained in the competition. [After consultation with the judge, a substitute dog may run in place of the excluded dog.]

The Judge of a Flyball competition shall remove from competition [any dog, which behaves in an uncontrollable manner, or] any Handler who wilfully interferes with another competitor or his dog.

Physical disciplining of a dog or [H]harsh handling will be severely condemned and will result in immediate elimination, independently of any complaint that could be lodged against the H[h]andler. Any dog that the presiding Judge determines is not [physically able, or] under control, to compete in a safe manner, will be excused from the event.

[10.3] 9.6.1 Interference [with competitors]

[The Judge of a Flyball competition shall remove from competition any dog, which behaves in an uncontrollable manner, or any handler who interferes wilfully with another competitor or his dog. The Judge may expel from competition any dog, which he considers unfit to compete. In the case of doubt, an official veterinarian shall be called to give his opinion but the Judge's decision is final.]

Definition of interference:

- A dog crossing the imaginary centre line between the lanes and wilfully runs into the section of the opposing Team and/or hampers or blocks or runs in the path of an opposing Team's dog;
- The imaginary centre line will extend to the runback or ready area. A Team who is interfered with in the runback area should approach the Judge who will consult both Team Captains of the two (2) competing Teams and, based on the facts presented, the Judge's decision will either be a warning to the interfering Team if the offence is minor and/or disqualification of the Team who interferes blatantly or when any interference happens again.

- A stationary loose ball rolling past the imaginary centre line is not deemed interference as provision is made for the runner to pick up loose balls, unless the ball is wilfully rolled into the opposing Team's lane.
- Retrieving a loose ball may only be deemed interference if the dog that picks up the ball blatantly runs into the other Team's lane.

Proposal 6:

Combine Schedule 05M Regulation 9.13 Competition by officials at Shows

Motivation: Changes made in line with Dog Jumping and Agility regulations.

The word "officiating" is changed to "judging" as the timekeepers and lane stewards are often Flyball competitors assisting with these functions thus they are "officiating" and are not necessarily qualified Flyball Judges and they are still allowed to compete.

- 9.13 Competition by officials at **S**[s]hows
- 9.13.1 A Judge at a <u>S</u>[s]how may not [enter or] handle a dog in the same Discipline (Breed, Obedience, Working Trials, [IPO]IGP, Dog Jumping, Agility, Carting, etc.[-]) as that in which he is [officiating] judging. This restriction does not apply in respect of another <u>S</u>[s]how held on the same day but held under another license.
- 9.13.2 A Flyball Judge at a Show may enter or handle a dog or dogs in any other

 Dogsport on the day(s) that he is officiating, provided the following criteria are strictly adhered to:
 - The Dogsport he is judging must take preference at all times.
 - At no time may the Dogsport he is judging be stopped or halted in any way so that he may compete in another Dogsport.
 - <u>The Dogsport he intends entering must have a commencement time before</u> or after the Dogsport he is judging.
- [9.13.2] 9.13.3 A KUSA representative may not enter, exhibit or handle a dog registered in his name at any KUSA licensed event held at the same venue on the day that he is officiating, nor in the same discipline held under the same license on any day.

Proposal 7:

Combine Schedule 05M Regulation 10.2 – Collars, Flyball harnesses and Leg wrapping

Motivation: A dog that is safely retrained by placing an arm or hand under the dog's abdomen or around the chest does not inflict pain or discomfort and is no different to a dog that pulls being restrained wearing a harness or collar.

10.2 Collars, Flyball harnesses and Leg wrapping

10.2.1 All dogs competing are to wear a flat buckle collar or Flyball harness of any material. Nothing will be attached to collars while competing, other than identification tags which may be up to 25mm in size. No hanging parts are allowed that are liable to flap around when the dog is racing. The dog may be safely restrained by placing an arm or hand around the dog's abdomen or chest but the dog may not be held [Holding any dog] by the scruff of the neck or other body parts, [is not permissible and] which will result in disqualification of the Handler and dog [from the team.]

Proposal 8:

See proposal 5 to move text

[10.3 Interference with competitors

The Judge of a Flyball competition shall remove from competition any dog, which behaves in an uncontrollable manner, or any handler who interferes wilfully with another competitor or his dog. The Judge may expel from competition any dog, which he considers unfit to compete. In the case of doubt, an official veterinarian shall be called to give his opinion but the Judge's decision is final.

Definition of interference:

- a dog crossing the imaginary centre line between the lanes and wilfully runs into the section
 of the opposing team and / or hampers or blocks or runs in the path of an opposing team's
 dog;
- -The imaginary centre line will extend to the run-back or ready area. A team who is interfered with in the runback area should approach the judge who will consult both team captains of the 2 competing teams and based on the facts presented, the judges' decision will either be a warning to the interfering team if the offence is minor and /or disqualification of the team who interferes blatantly or when any interference happens again.
- -A stationary loose ball rolling past the imaginary centre line is not deemed interference as provision is made for the runner to pick up loose balls unless the ball is wilfully rolled into the opposing team's lane.
- Retrieving a loose ball may only be deemed interference if the dog that picks up the ball blatantly runs into the other team's lane.]

Proposal 9:

Combine Schedule 05M Regulation 10.10.1 Hurdles

Motivation: All hurdles currently in use conform to the new width of 100 cm (1 meter) is easier to cut. The inner width of the hurdle remains 77cm.

10.10.1 Hurdles

[All 60cm cross boards must be phased out by 01 June 2023.]

The hurdles shall be to the following specifications:

Cross board internal height: 30cm, 25cm and 20cm high as per Regulation 6.2

Cross board internal width: 77cm with a maximum deviation of 1cm either way.

Cross board end-to-end: Minimum 89cm; maximum [97cm] 100cm.

Upright width: Minimum 35cm; maximum 45cm.

Proposal 10:

Combine Schedule 05M Regulation 11.1 Entry to Competition

Motivation: Online entries are also used for Non-championship Shows and the majority of Non-championship Shows have closing dates for online entries.

11.1 Entry to Competition

- 11.1.1 Non-<u>c[C]</u>hampionship S[s]hows: The <u>T[t]</u>eam <u>C[e]</u>aptain or nominee will enter his/her <u>T[t]</u>eam (Maximum 6 dogs per <u>T[t]</u>eam) on the day of the <u>N[n]</u>on-championship <u>S[s]</u>how <u>or by the closing date as stipulated by the Club if pre-entry is required.</u>
- 11.1.2 Championship $\underline{S[s]}$ hows: The $\underline{T[t]}$ eam $\underline{C[e]}$ aptain will enter his/her $\underline{T[t]}$ eam by the closing date as stipulated by the $\underline{C[e]}$ lub.

Proposal 11:

Combine Schedule 05M Regulation 13 – Schedule of Racing for Flyball

Motivation: There was a query as to whether, or not, the format of the competition may change halfway through as some Handlers wanted to compete in other branches of Dogsport. Amending this regulation makes it clear that it may not change. Teams that have already scored points by running more heats may not be advantaged by Teams to still complete the

round robin format by running fewer heats. Combine existing section 2.4 and 13 as it refers to the same item.

The existing wording in Regulation 13, which is less descriptive, should be removed.

13. Schedule of Racing for Flyball

The Judge must announce the number of heats per race to the competing Teams prior to the commencement of the competition based on the number of Teams competing. The Judge may not change the round robin format (number of heats per race) once the competition has commenced.

[The judge will communicate the number of heats for each race before the start of a competition.]

Proposal 12:

Combine Schedule 05M Regulation 13.2 Divisions

Motivation: The Division format already caters for each Division to be run in a round robin format: "The fastest/top Teams run in Division 1 and the slower/bottom half run in Division 2 based on a normal round robin format for each division." This (proposed deletion section) is confusing as we don't have that many Teams competing in South Africa that Divisional races need to be split in 2 or more rounds.

13.2 Divisions

If there are <u>eight (8)</u> [8] or more $\underline{T}[t]$ eams entered at any Flyball competition, (Championship or Non-championship S[s] hows) the event will be run in two (2) D[d] ivisions.

Format:

Speed Trial

8 TFAMS.

- All <u>T[t]</u>eams will run <u>two (2)</u> [2] heats; (a draw amongst <u>T[t]</u>eams or a pre-draw by the Judge will decide the running order) there is no win or lose but only the fastest time is recorded. (If a National record is run in a heat of a Speed Trial, it may be recorded and approved in terms of Schedule 05M 17.1);
- If a <u>T[t]</u>eam does not record a time in either <u>of</u> the <u>two (2)</u> [2] heats, that <u>T[t]</u>eam will run another heat (or heats <u>up to a maximum of five (5))</u> until a time is recorded. <u>If there is</u> still no time recorded after five (5) heats, the Team will run in the lower division;
- Teams may not deliberately run slower or not attempt to at least record a time, just to run in a lower division.
- <u>T[</u>t]eams may select any four (4) dogs to run in the Speed Trial and may swap dogs [in] <u>after</u> [each] <u>the first or subsequent</u> heats;
- The fastest/top <u>T[t]</u>eams (equal split + 1 if there [are] <u>is</u> an unequal number of <u>T[t]</u>eams) run in Division 1 and the slower / bottom half (equal split minus 1 if there [are] <u>is</u> an unequal number of <u>T[t]</u>eams) run in Division 2 based on a normal round robin format for each **D**[d]ivision.

Proposal 13:

Clarify Schedule 05M Regulation 14.3 – Equal points on completion of the Flyball event

Motivation: Interpretation of points (based on the fastest time and noted on the dog's Record Card) and score (1 point for a win and zero points for a loss of a heat) are clarified. Regulation 14.2 refers to the score sheet and the amendment is required to align score with the score sheet.

The rule to determine a winner is vague as it seems the Judge may decide to run additional heats but there is no clarity based on the fastest time – it appears from the current wording that the Team with the fastest time wins irrespective of whether the Judge decides to run an additional heat or heats. The proposed amendment is to clarify that it is the Judge's decision whether to run an additional heat OR to award the win based on the fastest time.

14.3 Equal [points] scores on completion of the Flyball event

The winner of the event is the $\underline{T}[t]$ eam with the [most points] <u>highest score</u>. In the case of $\underline{T}[t]$ eams having equal [points] <u>scores</u> after the completion of the competition, <u>the Judge has the final decision</u> [the following may apply] to determine a winner or placings, <u>based on one</u> of the following options:

- A deciding heat or heats will be run [at the discretion of the judge]; or-
- The <u>T[</u>t]eam with the fastest time wins. If the fastest times are the same, the next fastest time will apply.

Proposal 14:

Remove TEAM SHEET FLYBALL (page 38)

Motivation: Resubmitted after KUSA Fedco declined this proposal at the June 2024 Fedco meeting. Remove the Team Sheet in Schedule 05M.

Remove the Team Sheet page in its entirety as it serves no purpose with the introduction of the automated score sheet that is sent to KUSA after a competition. All the information on the Team Sheet is incorporated on the automated version.

[NOTE: It was decided at Fedco 06-2024 to leave this in the Schedule in case a Club did not use an electronic system].

5. QUALIFICATIONS FOR ENTRY AND LEAGUE ADMINISTRATION

5.1 Qualification:

Entry shall be open to all dogs that are registered with KUSA in terms of Regulation 3.1 above and have qualified to compete in Grade 1 <u>or the Veterans Class</u> as provided for in Schedule 05D.

6. JUDGING/COURSE DESIGN

- 6.10 All events forming part of the League shall be judged in accordance with Table A, except for the Veterans Class that will be judged under Table B.
- 6.11 All height categories in the Veterans Class will run first on the day.
- 6.12 The Tyre and Spread Hurdle may not be used in the Veterans Class.
- <u>6.13</u> <u>Time allowed will be set at 3.5m/s for Grade 1, including the jump-off, and at 2.5m/s for the Veterans Class.</u>

7. THE COMPETITION

- 7.5 [There shall be no substitution of either dog or handler during the duration of any NDJL year.] Substitutions of a dog's Handler is permissible during the course of the KUSA NDJL Competition without having an effect on the dog's score/points, provided the substitute Handler(s) have not competed in any other Centre where the same course was used.
- 7.6 The scoring system shall be as follows:
- 7.6.1 In the first round (including Veterans Class)
- 7.6.1.1. Dogs with clear rounds shall be awarded ten (10) points
- 7.6.1.2 Dogs with faults will be awarded points as follows:

0,01 to 5 faults: eight (8) points.

5,01 to 10 faults: six (6) points.

10,01 to 15 faults: four (4) points.

15,01 to 20 faults: two (2) points.

20,01 to 25 faults: one (1) point.

More than twenty-five (25) faults or Elimination: zero (0) points.

7.6.2 Jump-off (excluding Veterans Class)

Over a shortened course, but no obstacles are allowed to be moved. Sequence and jump direction may be changed and obstacles may be removed. The **jump-off** [Jump off] to be set with a running length of between 70m and 100m and requires at least one change of direction, and the inclusion of least one Grade 1 skill.

[Time allowed will be set the same for the whole competition, at 3.5m/s]

- 7.6.2.1 Dogs with clear rounds in the jump-off shall be awarded five (5) points.
- 7.6.2.2 Dogs with faults will be awarded points as follows:

0,01 to 5 faults: three (3) points.

5.01 to 10 faults: two (2) points.

10.01 to 15 faults: one (1) points.

More than 15,01 or Elimination: zero (0) points.

- 7.6.2.3 Bonus Points
- 7.6.2.3.1 Only **Grade 1** dogs going clear in the jump-off will be eligible for bonus points and bonus points will be awarded for beating the Time Allowed by the exact number of seconds to the hundredth of a second under the Time Allowed. These points are then corrected by being multiplied by 100 and divided by the **jump-off** [Jump off] course length. Bonus points = (T[t]ime A[a]llowed dog's time) x 100/(course length).
- 7.6.2.3.2 The overall winner of a round, in each height category, will be awarded one (1) bonus point.

	It was a very warm welcome back to Mrs Jacqui Verrinder after a short absence. Mrs Dianne Kee du Plessis and Mrs Karin Schoeman were once again elected as Treasurer and Registration Secretary respectively. Mrs Sally Young was elected as the Vice-Chairperson of the Breed Council for the 2025 period. Mrs May Oosthuizen from Boxer Club Gold Reef was once again kind enough to offer her assistance to the Breed Council and elected as the Secretary for a second term.
	I'd like to begin by thanking the Treasurer, Secretary and Registration Secretary for the generous contribution of their time voluntarily to perform the tasks required of them on behalf of the Breed Council. You three ladies provide a great contribution to the operation and administration of the Breed Council, allowing the Breed Council Representatives to focus on other related matters. I would also like to extend my gratitude to Mr Ken Hull for continuing to administer and support the FBCSA BC website, which contributes to the marketing of the Breed Council and what role it plays for the Boxer dog under KUSA. Again, this is an administratively challenging task that must be undertaken to ensure that the information on the site remains both relevant and current.

The year started with concerns over the enforcement of the FCI Breed Standard in terms of tail docking in the Breed, however, this concern was resolved after KUSA had circulated a notice regarding the stance of docked breeds showing in conformation shows under the KUSA's jurisdiction. Despite this dispensation, the topic remains somewhat controversial among different enthusiasts and breeders affiliated to KUSA. It would seem inevitable that docking of tails in Boxers will continue to be seen in South Africa for the time being and as long as it remains acceptable under KUSA, the Breed Council must support the same, however, I encourage Clubs to address the practice with both their members and breeders as it will inevitably become mandatory under both the FCI and KUSA for Boxers to be undocked and it would be regrettable to see the breeding of a very good specimen being lost to an aesthetic dilemma. It is felt that there are more important issues relating to health of the Breed that need to be addressed rather than spending the time and effort on matters that contribute in no way to the actual health and well-being of the Breed.

The resurrection of the Aptitude Test (APT-DMA) continued to be a topic of discussion throughout the year in the Breed Council. While it is supported overall by all member Clubs of the Breed Council, there remains several areas of debate still ongoing such as financial support of the initiative. Rightfully so, since it is not a Breed specific evaluation it remains an important topic to pursue as it is one of the few evaluations that does not require hours of preparation and effort on the part of the owner while still measuring the basic characteristics of the dog. There is no doubt that life today is very different and people don't spend as much time working their dogs as in the past, but we need to bear in mind that the Boxer is a working breed and if they are not continued working, I believe that the Breed will evolve into something incapable of working. There are several existing evaluations in which Boxers can participate such as the BST and AD and it is up to the Breed Council to encourage participation in such events, possibly even to host these under licence of the affiliated Clubs.

Sadly, the year saw some of our long-standing Breeders and supporters ,who have been involved with Boxers for decades, passing on and retiring from breeding due to health reasons. We will surely miss their presence but will never forget their contributions and most of all their expertise. Our condolences go out to the families of those who had passed and gratitude and appreciation to those that have retired from 'dog life' and wish you a joyful, peaceful and long retirement.

Twenty-twenty-six will see eight years of existence of the Breed Council and I have no doubt that this will be a turning point for the Breed Council where it must make some critical decisions. The question must be asked by each representative, and the answer carefully considered, what the Breed Council has done for the Breed or Boxer Clubs to date? Other than bringing the Federation of Boxer Clubs of Southern Africa (FBCSA) and the South African Boxer (SABOX) together as a united breed under KUSA, there does not appear to have been very much of significant recognition that has been achieved. I apologise to everyone if that statement offends anyone, however, I truly believe that as a Breed Council we have been afforded a golden opportunity to make a real difference to our Breed and so far we are failing to embrace that privilege. Personally, as someone that has tried many years to motivate a Breed Council in KUSA for another beloved breed it is disappointing to see the opportunities being missed in the Boxer Breed Council.

I have no doubt that if the Boxer community in KUSA, and globally for that matter, really want to see the Boxer continue to be a dog that everyone wants to own, that works like any of the best Working Breeds and that remains a healthy breed, then we need to act now. We need to be more proactive in what we're doing and we need to commit fully to complete what we set as our goals and that should start, within KUSA, with the Breed Council. I appeal to all

		representatives for the 2026 Breed Council to carefully consider whether they want to serve on
		the Breed Council and why they want to serve on the Breed Council. 2026 will be the time for reckoning as there are more and more queries from Boxer enthusiasts wanting to know what the Breed Council does and has done for the Breed. The question cannot continue to be
		evaded or vague and we need to produce results. I therefore appeal to everyone representing the Breed Council, myself included, to spend the next few weeks thinking about what goal will
		be set for the Breed Council that must be accomplished in the ensuing year. The goal must
		have a purpose, specifically intended to provide value to the Breed, the Breeders and the Boxer Clubs in KUSA. It must be achievable within one year and it must be measurable. We originally committed to taking on the objectives of the Breed Council and if we pull together and commit one hundred percent, I have no doubt that we can make 2026 the most successful year for the Breed Council.
