With nine Federal Councillors present for the afternoon session, for all Constitution-related items, the Chairman declared the majority for the changing of Articles and Schedules to be the same, i.e. six (two-thirds), whereas five would constitute a simple majority as required for any other decision to carry.</p> <p>The Chairman had informed the following absence was pre-advised for Saturday:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Clr DS Sparg on Saturday, due to work commitments, but he managed to join at 14.00. • Clr C Chelchinsky on Sunday from 10.00 to 12.00 to attend to a personal matter. 	3.1		<p>Annual Report from the Chairman</p> <p>The Chairman presented her Annual Report, the acceptance of which was proposed by NdP, seconded by LT, and endorsed by acclamation.</p>
	3.2		<p>Article 12.5 – Declaration of Interests The Article reads: <i>“Any member nominated to sit on the Federal Council, Executive Committee of the Kennel Union as well as the Executive Members (Chairman, Vice-Chairman, Secretary, Treasurer) of any Provincial Council of the Kennel Union, shall declare within one (1) month of appointment to the Secretary in writing all their interests, of whatsoever nature, in dog related activities. Where the governing body of the Kennel Union, or such person or persons to whom the authority is delegated, determine that any interests are in conflict with those of the Kennel Union, such nominated members’ appointment shall ipso facto be terminated.</i></p>

			<p>Having received no queries or comments from the Federal Councillors on the documentation circulated, PM confined her report to key areas of income and expense and expressed her satisfaction that KUSA had been able to declare a favourable “bottom line” for the year under review.</p> <p>Given the fact that unfavourable budgetary forecasts over the past number of years have not materialised, debate ensued on whether KUSA’s budgetary predictions were not perhaps unnecessarily understated. PM explained that the Budget Committee had always erred on the side of conservatism in its predictions by using a “worst case scenario” as its benchmark. Given the views of some Federal Councillors, the Budget Committee might be inclined to reconsider the ultra-conservative budgeting standards applied in the past.</p> <p>On a proposal from MV, seconded by JH, KUSA’s Annual Financial Statements and Auditors’ Report for the Year Ended 31.08.2024 were approved, unanimously.</p>
	3.4		<p>Appointment of Auditor The current Auditors are Sprigg Abbott Inc.</p> <p>Appointment.</p> <p>The Chairman solicited the views of PM and BD on the standard of the services of Sprigg Abbott Inc. Both commented favourably and PM made the point that the seamless auditing process was in no small measure due to Sprigg Abbott Inc.’s well-documented knowledge and understanding of KUSA’s business and operations.</p> <p>On a proposal from NdP, seconded by RJ, KUSA’s current Auditors, Sprigg Abbott Inc., were appointed, unanimously, for the ensuing Financial Year, ending 31.08.2025.</p>

		3.5.1	<p>Election of Chairman of the Federal Council and Election of President of KUSA – Article 16.2.2.1 The current Chairman, Cllr JM Hubbard, retires on 31.12.2024 The current President, Mrs DE Powell, retires on 31.12.2024</p> <p><i>(Note: Article 14.7: The Provincial Council Chairmen and Vice-Chairman of the Districts of Gauteng and Surrounds members of the Federal Council shall submit to the Secretary nominations for the offices of President and of Chairman of the Federal Council which shall be placed on the Agenda for the last Federal Council meeting to be held in the fourth year of the terms of office of the current President and Chairman of the Federal Council.)</i></p> <p>The following nominations had been received by the deadline of 11.10.2024:</p> <p>Nominations received for Chairman of the Federal Council of KUSA</p> <p>Mrs JM Hubbard, nominated by Cllr NJ du Preez, Cllr DC Sparg, Cllr RD Juckes, Cllr M Vorster, Cllr N Redtenbacher & Cllr LC Thornhill.</p> <p>No other nominations had been received.</p> <p>JH invited the Vice-Chairman, NdP, to take the chair for this item.</p> <p>NdP requested GR to confirm that all the Chairmen of the Provincial Councils had nominated Cllr JM Hubbard as Chairman of the Federal Council for a four-year term. GR confirmed this, but informed NdP that, although all the Chairmen had submitted their nominations, he had received no nomination from the Vice-Chairman of DOGSPC, CC, who was also entitled to submit a nomination.</p>

		<p>CC apologised and said that she and the Chairman of DOGSPC had agreed on the nomination of JH. NR confirmed this and apologised that DOGSPC had neglected to submit the Vice-Chairman’s nomination in favour of Cllr Hubbard.</p> <p>In view of the above clarification, NdP proposed that CC’s late nomination be accepted by Fedco, seconded by NR. The proposal was accepted, unanimously.</p> <p>Having received nominations from all the Federal Councillors entitled to submit same, NdP declared Cllr JM Hubbard to be the duly elected Chairman of the Federal Council of KUSA for the period 01.01.2025 to 31.12.2028.</p> <p>On behalf of Fedco, NdP expressed his thanks and appreciation to JH for her exemplary leadership over the past four years and conveyed the expectation and confidence that KUSA and its business would be taken to even greater heights during JH’s ensuing term.</p> <p>In conclusion, NdP congratulated JH on having earned the confidence and loyalty of all the vote-eligible Federal Councillors and wished her well for her second term in office, applauded by all.</p> <p>NdP handed the chair back to JH.</p> <p><i>Nominations received for President of KUSA</i></p> <p>Mrs JD Barrow, nominated by Cllr DC Sparg.</p> <p>Mrs DE Powell, nominated by Cllr NJ du Preez, Cllr RD Juckes, Cllr M Vorster, Cllr N Redtenbacher & Cllr LC Thornhill.</p> <p>Mrs JD Barrow’s nomination was not seconded and, since Mrs DM Powell had received five (5) out of a possible seven (7) nominations, the Chairman declared Mrs DM Powell to be the duly elected President of KUSA for the period 01.01.2025 to 31.12.2028.</p> <p>[Note: The Chairman requested the KUSA Secretary to inform Mrs Powell of her election as President of KUSA and to copy the Federal Council.]</p>
	3.5.2	<p>Election of Vice-Chairman of the Federal Council – Article 16.2.2.2</p> <p>The current Vice-Chairman of the Federal Council, Cllr NJ du Preez, retires on 31.12.2025.</p> <p>Noted.</p>
	3.5.3	<p>Election of Patron of KUSA – Article 16.2.2.3</p> <p><i>“The Federal Council shall elect a Patron; Life Members; Life Vice-Presidents; and any Vice-Presidents on termination of their fourth year in office.”</i></p> <p>Subsequent to the death of the previous Patron, the late Mr GRP Eva, on 17.03.2021, no person had been identified to hold this office for the unexpired portion of Mr Eva’s term, ending 31.12.2024.</p> <p>Nominations for Patron of KUSA to be considered by Fedco.</p> <p>NdP enquired whether there were any set criteria for being elected Patron of KUSA. JH said that, to the best of her knowledge, no such criteria existed, but she believed that the person so appointed would be a respected and revered member of the dog community and somebody who had supported, assisted and promoted KUSA over a considerable number of years.</p>

			<p>The Chairman called for nominations, but none were forthcoming.</p> <p>The Chairman suggested that this matter be deferred to Fedco 12-2025, to afford members of Fedco the opportunity to give it further thought. However, should anybody have a nomination by Fedco 06-2025, they would be welcome to put it forward at that meeting.</p> <p>The Chairman’s suggestion was supported, unanimously.</p>

		3.5.5	<p>Election of Life Vice-Presidents – Article 16.2.2.3</p> <p>List of current Life Vice-Presidents: Mrs JD Barrow Mrs S Bloomfield Mr RB Jenkins Mr NS Kay Mrs DE Powell Mrs A Olivier Dr HRA van der Merwe</p> <p>Any nominations for Life Vice-Presidents to be considered by Fedco.</p> <p>No new Life Vice-Presidents were nominated.</p>
		3.5.6	<p>Appointment of Legal Adviser to KUSA <i>At Fedco 12-2018, it was resolved that Brig Gen (retd.) NJ du Preez should continue as Legal Adviser to the KUSA for an indefinite period. The current Legal Adviser to KUSA is Brig Gen (retd.) NJ du Preez.</i></p> <p>Appointment of Brig Gen (retd.) NJ du Preez as Legal Adviser to KUSA for a further term of one (1) year, should he be prepared to serve in such capacity for the period.</p>

			<p>Having indicated his willingness to continue serving as Legal Adviser to KUSA, the Chairman declared Brig Gen (retd.) NJ du Preez duly appointed to assist KUSA in that capacity during the ensuing year.</p>
		3.5.7	<p>Article 16.2.3 – Appeals Committee <i>“The Federal Council shall nominate at least three (3) members of the Federal Council, who shall act as an Appeals Committee on behalf of the Federal Council to consider any appeals lodged in terms of the Disciplinary Rules.”</i></p> <p>[Note: It was customary to elect <i>all</i> Provincial Council Chairmen of the Federal Council and the Vice-Chairman of DOGSPC to serve on the Appeals Committee, if so appointed, under the chairmanship of the Chairman of the Federal Council, who shall be an <i>ex officio</i> member of any Appeals Committee. When required, the Chairman of the Federal Council shall appoint <i>two (2)</i> additional members of the Federal Council to consider any Appeal.]</p> <p>Appointment of all Provincial Council Chairmen of the Federal Council and the Vice-Chairman of DOGSPC to serve on the Appeals Committee, if and when so appointed by the Chairman of the Federal Council.</p> <p>Having reminded Fedco of the customary procedure set out in the Note above. It was agreed, unanimously, that all Provincial Council Chairmen of the Federal Council and the Vice-Chairman of DOGSPC would be eligible to serve on the Fedco Appeals Committee (FAC), if and when <i>two (2) members</i> were so appointed by the Chairman of the Federal Council.</p>
	3.6		<p>K9 Administration Upgrade Project</p> <p>Report-back from the KUSA Office.</p> <p>The Chairman invited PM to update Fedco on the K9 Administration Upgrade Project.</p> <p>PM informed Fedco that significant progress had been made with the K9 Administration Upgrade Project, despite the following stumbling blocks:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Extra computer development work was required to accommodate online applications for the registration of Affixes on the FCI International Kennel Name Register. • As with all software, the Symphony framework required updates (several updated versions were run simultaneously), which resulted in some compatibility issues across the application. Repairs had to be made as and when identified while user testing was in progress. • This had a major impact on the initial online payment structure and methodology which, when initially tested, worked in the earlier stages of development. With subsequent coding development done as user testing progressed, more workflow complexity was added. It was realised that enhancements and amendments would be required to be made to the fees, invoicing and payment structure to meet financial, accounting and audit requirements. This work is currently being undertaken, requiring over 300 <i>manual</i> adjustments. User testing has been somewhat hampered, as the system is designed in such a manner that one cannot progress to the next stage of the application process until payment has been processed and confirmed as having been received. • As soon as the fee and payment issues have been resolved, stringent user testing would continue to complete testing of the online transaction applications for

			<p>Affixes, Registrations and Memberships.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> The aim was to focus on testing the sections pertaining to Clubs, Show Licences, Show Schedules, Show Returns and Champion Status Applications from early January 2025, with the added intention of integrating the Breed Standards Nomenclature changes and FCI Breed Groupings, where necessary. The impact on timelines of these particular additional enhancements and adjustments still need to be assessed. <p>PM reminded Fedco that she had circulated the developers' November 2024 KUSA Project Status Report, which concludes on an optimistic note: <i>We are nearing completion of the current application phase. While challenges remain, particularly around database linkage, progress has been significant. The team is on track to complete this phase within two to three weeks, followed by rigorous testing and bug-fixing. Collaboration with stakeholders remains key to ensuring all requirements are met effectively.</i></p> <p>The Chairman enquired whether there were any questions, but none were forthcoming.</p> <p>The Chairman congratulated PM and the KUSA Office on the progress made and said she was looking forward to the eventual implementation phase.</p> <p>Noted.</p>

		3.7.2	<p>KUSA Office – Relocation Strategy Plan (Fedco 08.2021 Item 3.3, Fedco 12-2021 Item 3.10.3, Fedco 06-2022 Item 3.5.3, Fedco 12-2022 Item 3.7.2, Fedco 06-2023 Item 3.4.2, Fedco 12-2023 Item 3.7.2, Fedco 06-2024 Item 3.4.2)</p> <p><i>The Chairman enquired from the Acquisitions Team – RJ, NdP & MV – whether there had been any subsequent developments in their investigation into a property acquisition to possibly serve as KUSA's headquarters in future.</i></p> <p><i>Speaking on behalf of the Acquisitions Team, RJ said it was very difficult to actively pursue the acquisition of a property in the absence of a budget, a proper brief and timelines. In view of this, he recommended that, since the status quo seemed to adequately meet KUSA's requirements at present, it was probably advisable to wait until KUSA's current accommodation was no longer suitable.</i></p> <p><i>All present agreed.</i></p> <p>Report on further developments, if any.</p>

		<p>Discussion ensued on whether, or not, the possible acquisition of property should be recycled on future Fedco Agendas, when the current business model of a rotationally staffed hub in conjunction with a work-from-home workforce seemed to adequately meet KUSA's present workplace requirements. This might change in future, at which point property acquisition might once more become a consideration.</p> <p>To forestall this item featuring on future Fedco Agendas, only to be deferred, NdP proposed that Fedco should accept that the status quo would remain for the foreseeable future. Should a viable opportunity to acquire a property present itself, or should KUSA's accommodation requirements change, a fresh proposal could be brought to the table. NdP's proposal was seconded by RJ. No objections were raised and the motion passed, unanimously.</p>
3.8		<p>Protection of Personal Information Act (POPIA), No. 4 of 2013 (Fedco 12-2022 Item 3.8, Fedco 06-2023 Item 3.5, Fedco 12-2023 Item 3.8, Fedco 06-2024 Item 3.5)</p> <p>Progress Report.</p> <p>The Chairman informed Fedco that, following her judging assignment in Malaysia, where she had the opportunity of consulting with the President of the Malaysian Kennel Club (MKC), Mr Gopi Krishnan, she had made considerable progress in drafting a Privacy Policy for KUSA. As a member of the FCI's A2O Section, she had also been given access to the Privacy Policy of the Philippine Canine Club, Inc. (PCCI) and, additionally, had benefited from the advice of her personal Financial Adviser. From the outset, she had consulted the Privacy Policies of the FCI and the Royal Kennel Club, both voluminous documents but, unfortunately, not easily comprehensible.</p> <p>With the benefit of ten years' hindsight since the promulgation of the POPIA, the local experts with whom the Chairman had consulted, had all advised her to err on the side of simplicity, as the elaborate Privacy Policies, initially prepared by companies and organisations, had since proved to be unnecessarily complex. In her initial draft, she had therefore tried to stick to the basics, although the text is substantially based on the A2O examples mentioned above.</p> <p>Once completed, the Chairman intended to share her draft with the KUSA Legal Adviser and the KUSA Office for scrutiny and amendment. Once the revised document was ready for presentation, it was her intention to table it for discussion at a Fedco Discussion Forum (FDF) early in the new year, after which any amendments directed by Fedco would be made and a final draft be prepared for adoption at a Special Meeting convened for that purpose, as well as any other purposes.</p> <p>For noting.</p> <p>Noted.</p>

	4.1		<p>Loss of Affiliation – Article 9 (Fedco 12-2017, Fedco 06-2019, Fedco 6-2020, Fedco12-2020, Fedco 06-2021, Fedco 12-2021 Item 3.6, Fedco 06-2022 Item 4.1, Fedco 12-2022 Item 4.1, Fedco 06-2023 Item 4.1, Fedco 12-2023 Item 4.1, Fedco 06.2024 Item 4.1)</p> <p>Note: <i>The following ruling was made at Fedco 06-2017:</i> “Effective 01.01.2018, no licences will be issued for either Championship, or Non-Championship, Shows, unless Clubs are up to date with all returns required in terms of the KUSA Constitution.”</p> <p><i>The following ruling was made at Fedco 12-2017:</i> “Clubs that fail to comply with the provisions of Articles 9.1.3 and 9.1.4 for a period of eighteen months from the Fedco meeting where the breach was reported, will be recommended for disaffiliation.”</p> <p>[Note from Fedco 06-2020: During the ensuing discussion, it was noted that, as a result of the above-mentioned Fedco rulings made in 2017, there had been a marked improvement in the timely submission of AGM documentation by Clubs. However, there were still a few “repeat offenders” and it was agreed, unanimously, that the overdue Clubs in red should be sent a notice advising that, should the outstanding documentation not be received within three months from the date of the notice, the Clubs in question would be recommended for disaffiliation at Fedco 12-2020.]</p> <p>It was unanimously confirmed that the KUSA Office should continue with the policy as agreed at Fedco 06-2020 and recommend Clubs for disaffiliation at future Fedco meetings should they fail to meet the deadlines for submission of documentation as required per the final notices.</p>

As reported to the Federal Council at various meetings, preparations for the implementation of the revised ***KUSA Affix and FCI Kennel Name Registration Protocol*** had progressed steadily since Fedco 06-2024 and roll-out was accomplished on 01.10.2024.

Progress Report from the KUSA Office.

The Chairman invited PM to update Fedco on the progress the KUSA Office had made with the registration of KUSA Affixes in the FCI's International Kennel Name Register.

PM presented her report under bullet-points:

- Since the roll-out on 1 October 2024, one hundred and fifty-five (155) applications had been received from members to register their KUSA Affixes on the FCI International Kennel Name Register.
- Of the 155, ten (10) were new Affix applications, whereas the balance (145), were applications for registration of KUSA-registered Affixes not yet due for renewal and/or Affixes with "twenty-five years or more" status.
- Budget projections were set at 20 FCI Kennel Name registrations per month for KUSA Affix renewals, with the estimated total projected for this financial year, including new Affix applications, being 294. Fifty-three percent (53%) of the projected quantum had been achieved within the first two months.
- Since the project had been launched, three batches of applications have been forwarded to the FCI for their acceptance and processing. The first batch of twenty (20) applications was sent to the FCI on 22 October 2024, the second batch of forty (40) on 6 November 2024 and the third batch of forty-two (42) on 20 November 2024.
- On Thursday, 28 November 2024, the KUSA Office received confirmation from the FCI Affix Department that the forty (40) Kennel Names sent as the second batch had all been accepted and approved (all without ZA extensions) and it was anticipated that these 40 Kennel Names would soon be added to the list of International Kennel Names published on the FCI website.
- Commencing the week following Fedco 12-2024, the forty (40) Primary Grantees of the now FCI-registered Kennel Names would be sent a letter of confirmation of registration of their Affixes on the FCI International Kennel Name Register and a digital copy of the newly designed Affix Registration Certificate. The ten (10) new applications would, of course, first be published on the KUSA website for the requisite 30-day objection period, after which, should no objections be received, they would be registered by KUSA in January 2025.
- The FCI's invoice for the processing of the forty (40) Kennel Names should reach KUSA during December 2024 or January 2025.
- An email was sent to the FCI Kennel Name Department enquiring why the second batch of KUSA Affixes had been processed ahead of the first batch of twenty (20) KUSA Affixes, sent in October 2024, just in case the first batch had not reached the FCI.
- The Staff training on procedures and processes put in place were coming to fruition and appear to be working well. A complicating factor was that the enhancements of the Affix Application section of the new online transaction portal

Please be aware that all the expenses related to the dog and owner's travel and accommodation are under the responsibility of the relevant owner and/or NCO. The FCI will not charge any entry fee and the Finnish Kennel Club will offer a discount on the fee for the FCI World Dog Show, in case the dog in question is entered at both the Challenge and the World Dog Show.</i> 4. <i>The dog selected to represent its NCO must be registered with the studbook (vs appendix) of the NCO in question.</i> 5. <i>All participating dogs will be split into three groups, on a random basis. The DSC found that the complaint was fully substantiated, and that, in humiliating and undermining the authority of the Mr van Vliet, the Respondent had wilfully engaged in conduct that was improper, disgraceful and disrespectful and prejudicial and injurious to the interests of canine affairs and to members, officials and persons concerned and connected therewith. 2. The DSC therefore found the Respondent guilty of contravening Schedule 01 Rules 4.1.1 and 4.1.1.4, and further of contravening Schedule 04 Regulation 25, read with Schedule 03 Regulation 37.

		<p>3. The DSC further found the Respondent guilty of breaching Regulations 1.3, 1.4, 1.7, 5.1, 5.17 and 5.18 of Schedule 09 (Code of Ethics for Members of the Kennel Union of Southern Africa).</p> <p>4. The DSC took note that Schedule 05B(02) Appendix B (International Utility Dogs Regulations (IGP)), under the section "Disciplinary Rights", makes provision for an objection to be lodged against a Trial Judge's method of assessment. It is stated under this section that in the section that: <i>"Justifiable objections may be made in cases where the judge has violated the trial regulations but not against his assessments. Any such objections must be made in writing and addressed to the relevant authority and must be lodged with the show holding organisation and signed by the complainant."</i> (emphasis added). It is further stated in the section that <i>"Public criticism of a judge's assessments may result in dismissal from the trial grounds and further disciplinary action may follow."</i></p> <p>Penalties:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. In terms of Rule 11.1.2 of Schedule 01, the Respondent is excluded from taking part in, or having any connection with, or attending or participating or handling a dog at any Show, Obedience Class, Working Trial or Field Trial or other event held under KUSA licence, or from acting as an officer of a Club for a period of six (6) months. 2. In terms of Rule 11.5 of Schedule 01, the DSC ruled that the penalty be suspended in full for a period of three (3) years, on condition that, during the period of suspension, the Respondent does not contravene any of the provisions of Schedule 01 Rule 4, or any other provisions in the KUSA Constitution, Rules and Regulations that would form the basis of a valid complaint. 3. The DSC ruled that the above penalty will take effect on 1 July 2024. <p>Subsequent to the release of the finding of the DSC, the Respondent lodged an appeal in terms of Schedule 01 Rule 12.</p> <p>FAC Findings:</p> <p>The FAC considered the Complaint in totality and concluded that there was sufficient evidence, substantiated on a balance of probabilities, to uphold the DSC finding that Ms Brunner did not follow the procedure for laying a complaint as laid out in Schedule 05B(02) App B namely:</p> <p><i>Justifiable objections may be made in cases where the judge has violated the trial regulations but not against his assessments. Any such objections must be made in writing and addressed to the relevant authority and must be lodged with the show holding organisation and signed by the complainant. Objections must be lodged within 8 days of the close of the trial.</i></p> <p>The FAC partially upheld the DSC finding that Ms Brunner had wilfully engaged in conduct that could be considered improper and dishonourable to officials of KUSA which provided sufficient grounds for a complaint to be laid in terms of Schedule 01, Rule 4.1.1.</p> <p>FAC Outcome:</p> <p>Taking the above into account, the FAC considered the penalties imposed on Ms Brunner</p>

The Judge on the day failing to adhere to Schedule 05B(02) App B Special Requirements in the FCI-IBGH 3 test with regard to the order in which exercises were to be carried out; 2. The Club failing to adhere to the Schedule 03 Regulation 37.1 which states (underline added for clarity): <u>"The Show Committee shall report, in writing, to the Secretary any case of alleged fraudulent or discreditable conduct, and any default or omission at or in connection with a Show which is brought to its notice. Every such report shall be submitted to the Secretary within seven (7) days of the show and shall be accompanied by all documents and information in connection therewith which is in its possession of power."</u>; 3. The Trial not meeting the requirements under Schedule 05B(02) App B which state, under Trial Participants, that: <i>"The examination (trial) must have a minimum of 4 participants per trial day. The minimum number of participants per day may only be less if for FCI-BH/VT or BH/VT (NPO) examinations these dogs pass and try for a further examination (FCI-IGP-1, FCI-IFH 1) at the same event."</i>; 4. The Non-championship Show held on 22 March 2024 not being compliant with the stipulation for trial days as provided for in Schedule 05B(02) App B under Trial Days; and 5. The validity of qualifications awarded on the day. <p>The FAC's intention in pointing out the above shortcomings, is to enable the Executive Committee to consider taking appropriate pre-emptive steps, either by way of regulation, or training, to hopefully avoid the recurrence of such disruptive events in future.</p> <p>The Acting KUSA Secretary in this Case (Chairman of the Executive Committee) was requested to bring the abovementioned points to the attention of the Executive Committee for appropriate action to be taken.</p> <p>For noting.</p> <p>Noted.</p>

Apart from the FCI's country-of-origin (Germany) Breed Standard for the Deutsche Dogge, the Club presented a compelling case for the colour Merle to be recognised as a valid colour in South Africa, as it is under the FCI Breed Standard as well as under the American Kennel Club Breed Standard.</p> <p>The Club also presented KUSA with the results of a "mini survey" it had conducted of Club members and some non-members, all current breeders and/or owners of Great Danes, each Voting Paper fully completed and signed. This considerably lightened the administrative burden on the KUSA Office of conducting the obligatory survey.</p> <p>As prescribed in the KUSA Protocol for Adopting Breed Standards, KUSA extracted a list of breeders of Great Danes who had registered litters during the past seven (7) years, as well as a list of persons who had taken transfer of one or more Great Danes into their Registered Ownership during the same seven-year period. From these lists, non-members were eliminated, since they were not eligible to participate in any poll conducted by KUSA. The lists were further diluted by the members who had already been surveyed by the Club.</p> <p>On 05.10.2024, the KUSA Secretary wrote to the remaining Breeders and Registered Owners, forwarding to them all the relevant information provided by the SAGDA to motivate its proposal for the substitution of the RKC Breed Standard with the FCI Breed Standard. In keeping with KUSA’s commitment to the FCI to incrementally adopt its Nomenclature and Breed Standards over an undetermined period, the Breed Standards Committee believes that adopting FCI Breed Standards for breeds that are seldom, if ever, imported into South Africa, or had declined in popularity to the point of obscurity, goes some way towards demonstrating KUSA’s goodwill and its ongoing efforts to achieve conversions whenever possible. Apart from regular reminders at General Assemblies, the FCI has exerted minimum pressure on KUSA over its past thirty-one (31) years of full FCI membership but, for this to continue, there has to be some form of <i>quid pro quo</i> on the part of KUSA.</p> <p>During the previous conversion of this kind, seven (7) years of non-activity was deemed as a fair benchmark for the conversion of Breed Standards of breeds which no longer (or have never) enjoyed popularity in South Africa. 9.4		<p>Application for a once-off Inter-variety mating of Dachshunds – Long-haired to Smooth-haired</p> <p>Background: The above application was made to the Executive Committee in terms of Schedule 02 Regulation 1.1.7, which provides as follows:</p> <p>1.1.7 Cross-matings <i>Notwithstanding the provisions of Regulation 1.1.6 hereof the Executive Committee shall be empowered to establish provisos in order to permit matings of different categories of the same breeds where such cross mating is recommended by a Breed Council, where such exists or is considered desirable in the interests of improving a breed where similar arrangements have been permitted by the club in the country of origin or development of such breeds.</i></p> <p>In applying to the Executive Committee, the applicant failed to take account of the overarching Regulation 1.1, which stipulates:</p> <p>1.1 The Kennel Union may also accept for registration, <i>subject to such terms and conditions as the Federal Council may stipulate from time to time:</i> (emphasis added)</p> <p>Having granted permission for the proposed mating at Exco 06-2026, the Executive Committee was alerted to the fact that terms and conditions for such a mating need to be set by the Federal Council. In consequence, at a Special Meeting convened for the purpose, Exco “decided to withdraw their approval for such a mating but, noted that the application could be resubmitted, provided it followed due process, namely that, as the request required dispensation from Schedule 02 Regulation 1.1, it should be submitted to Fedco with all necessary supporting documentation.”</p> <p>Following the publication of the Minutes of the Special Meeting, the applicant duly applied to the Federal Council for the required permission to proceed with the proposed Inter-variety mating and the matter was tabled for discussion at the Fedco Discussion Forum (FDF) on Tuesday, 13 August 2024, where the application and supporting documentation were considered, as well as the various submissions by members of the Dachshund community opposing the application. In the interest of transparency, and in an attempt to hopefully broker consensus on this issue, Fedco recommended that the members of the two Dachshund Clubs (SA Dachshund Club and Teckel Club of SA) should be invited to a consultation meeting with a Fedco-appointed Task Team, comprised of Cllrs N Redtenbacher, NJ du Preez, L Thornhill and RD Juckes, acting as mediators. Cllr Redtenbacher undertook to arrange the envisaged consultation/mediation meeting, which duly took place on Wednesday, 21 August 2024.</p> <p>At the subsequent FDF, held on Tuesday, 27 August 2024, Cllr Redtenbacher reported on the outcome of the consultation/mediation meeting, which Cllr RD Juckes was ultimately unable to attend, and informed the Federal Council that the forum had, unfortunately, not been able to reach consensus on the issue. She alerted the Federal Council to a joint proposal submitted to the consultation/mediation meeting by the two Dachshund Clubs, the</p>

		<p>merits of which were not discussed at the FDF. However, it was acknowledged that it was incumbent on the Federal Council to revert to the Executive Committee with recommendations for the matter to be finalised and the outcome to be communicated to the interested parties by way of the Minutes of an urgent Exco Special Meeting convened for the sole purpose of dealing with this matter.</p> <p>The Executive Committee was thereafter duly informed of the Federal Council’s unanimous recommendation that:</p> <p>The proposed once-off Inter-variety mating contemplated by the applicant should be authorised by the Executive Committee, in accordance with Schedule 02 Regulation 1.1.7 – Cross-matings, and imposed the following provisos should the mating go ahead, and a litter be produced:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. First-generation progeny from this proposed Inter-variety mating should be registered reflecting the coat variety according to the dominant expression of the gene (in this case all progeny will be Smooth-haired). 2. The Second-generation progeny, are also to be registered as per expression of the dominant gene, which should be clear by the age of 8 (eight) weeks and any Second-generation puppies intended for breeding will be required to be DNA tested for coat inheritance prior to mating and may only be permitted to be mated to dogs of the same gene expression. 3. The progeny from the present Inter-variety coat mating should only be registered once there is clarity on the coat-type. Should this only become clear after the expiration period of the KUSA-regulated registration period, reclassification according to coat variety may be permitted in accordance with Schedule 02 Regulation 1.1.8 – Reclassification of Recessives. 4. In this particular Inter-variety mating, the coat-variety classifications, i.e. Long-haired (LH) and Smooth-haired (SH), will be added as bracketed suffixes to the registered names of the Dam and Sire and, subsequently, to the registered names of their progeny, which should make it clear on every <i>Certificate of Registration and Certified Pedigree</i> issued by KUSA, that the registered progeny had resulted from a past inter-variety mating and indicate which coat-varieties of the ancestors had produced the offspring. <p>The requested urgent Special Meeting was convened by the Executive Committee on 3 September 2024 in order to reach a decision based on Fedco’s recommendations and to reflect such decision in the Minutes of the Meeting to bring the desired finality to this matter.</p> <p>At the Special Meeting, the Executive Committee unanimously approved Fedco’s recommendations.</p> <p>For noting.</p> <p>Noted.</p>

Motivation:

With the introduction of the new Schedule 03A Appendix 1, to provide for Breed Classes and Order of Judging in the same way as it is done in Schedule 03, it is necessary to refer to the KUSA-recognised Breeds as they appear in their FCI Groupings for judging at FCI International Shows. Apart from the headings of the two Appendices, the addition of the new Appendix "A2" necessitates minor amendment within Schedule 02, as set out below:

Amendment to Regulation 1.2:

Recognition of Breeds

The breeds of dogs recognised by the Federal Council for the purpose of classification, registration and competition, are those listed in Appendix "A1" **(for KUSA Championship and Non-Championship Shows)** and Appendix "A2" **(for FCI International Shows)** to this Schedule.

Amendments to Regulation 2:

2. BREED GROUPS

2.1 For the purpose of competition between dogs of different breeds, the grouping of breeds **shall, for competition at KUSA Championship and Non-championship Shows,** [as shown in Appendix "A" shall be held to define sporting breeds, namely: Hounds, Gundogs and Terriers; and non-sporting breeds, namely: Utility, Herding, Working and Toy] **be in accordance with the traditional seven-group classification of dog breeds as reflected in Appendix "A1", i.e. Gundogs, Herding, Hounds, Terriers, Toys, Utility and Working.**

2.2 For the purpose of competition between dogs of different breeds, the grouping of breeds **shall, for competition at FCI International Shows,** [as shown in Appendix "A" shall be held to define sporting breeds, namely: Hounds, Gundogs and Terriers; and non-sporting breeds, namely: Utility, Herding, Working and Toy] **be in accordance with the FCI's ten-group classification of dog breeds as reflected in Appendix "A2", i.e. Group 1 (Sheepdogs & Cattle dogs), Group 2 (Pinscher & Schnauzer – Molossoid & Swiss Mountain and Cattle dogs), Group 3 (Terriers), Group 4 (Dachshunds), Group 5 (Spitz & Primitive Types), Group 6 (Scenthounds and Related Breeds), Group 7 (Pointing Dogs), Group 8 (Retrievers, Flushing Dogs and Water Dogs), Group 9 (Companion & Toy Dogs) and Group 10 (Sighthounds).**

Amendment to Regulation 17.1:

17.1 Subject to the approval of the Executive Committee, when a dog of a breed not already listed in Appendix [~~A~~] **"A1" or Appendix "A2"** to this Schedule is imported, the breed may be added to the list of recognised breeds and the dog registered, provided that the breed is recognised by the FCI, The Royal Kennel Club or any National Canine Organisation with which the Kennel Union is in reciprocity and the conditions in respect of Registrations contained in this Schedule are adhered to.

		10.1.1	<p>Proposed Amendments to Schedule 03 Regulation 42.1 – Provision for Sire of Merit (SOM) and Dam of Merit (DOM) Titles</p> <p>Submitted by the Districts of Gauteng & Surrounds & Northern Areas Provincial Councils.</p> <p>Proposal: To introduce Sire of Merit (SOM) and Dam of Merit (DOM) Titles for dogs competing in the showing by encouraging new owners to exhibit the progeny of such Sires and Dams.</p> <p>Motivation: In the interest of motivating breeders and exhibitors to encourage new puppy buyers to join as KUSA members and exhibit their dogs, at least until they have attained Champion status, we propose the introduction of two additional titles.</p> <p>“Sire of Merit” and “Dam of Merit” titles would encourage breeders to get new puppy owners involved in KUSA and participating at Shows thus, in turn, increasing entry numbers and KUSA levies payable.</p> <p>For a dog or bitch to attain these titles, the following would need to be met:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Sire of Merit (SOM) – A dog that has produced at least ten (10) Conformation

- Champion offspring.
- Dam of Merit (DOM) – A bitch that has produced at least five (5) Conformation Champion offspring.
- At least three (3) of the conformation Champion titles, gained by the offspring (CH, GR.CH, SP.CH, INT.CH (C.I.B), FCI A2O CH), must have been awarded after the implementation date.

These titles could easily also be applicable and introduced for Dogsport exhibits, not only Breed.

Moreover, the qualification criteria for the introduction of these two titles is uncomplicated, easily verifiable for the Office, and does not create any extra administration on the part of show-holding Clubs. The system is not prohibitive or particularly onerous for Breeds with either large, or small, numbers. Additionally, it is more difficult to win Challenge Certificate points in the numerically strong Breeds, thereby encouraging support for Shows held in the smaller, geographically “isolated” provinces. This should be achieved, as not only will dogs in numerically strong Breeds need to attend more Shows to gain the required Challenge Certificate points, but in conjunction with the proposal to re-introduce the “Out-of-Centre” (away) Challenge Certificate (CC) (refer Item 10.1.4), this also requires that the Challenge Certificate (CC) points be gained in at least two (2) different Centres, as defined by Article 13 and Schedule 03 Reg. 2.1.1. With regard to the issuing of Certificates by the KUSA Office, two new certificates would need to be designed in similar style to the current Champion, Grand Champion and/or Supreme Champion templates for the KUSA Office to issue digital certificates in PDF format for both these Merit titles.

Proposed amendments to Schedule 03 Regulation 42.1 – Champion Dogs:

Insertions in **underlined bold type**.

42.1.7. Sire of Merit (SOM) and Dam of Merit (DOM) Titles

42.1.7.1. The Federal Council may award the title of “Sire of Merit (SOM)” to any dog registered on the Primary Breed Register of the Kennel Union, or registered by any National Canine Organisation recognised by KUSA, which has produced no fewer than ten (10) Breed Champion offspring registered with KUSA or with any National Canine Organisation recognised by KUSA.

42.1.7.2. The Federal Council may award the title of “Dam of Merit (DOM)” to any dog registered on the Primary Breed Register of the Kennel Union, or registered by any National Canine Organisation recognised by KUSA, which has produced no fewer than five (5) Breed Champion offspring registered with KUSA or with any National Canine Organisation recognised by KUSA.

42.1.7.3. At least three (3) of the Breed Champion titles, gained by the offspring (CH, GR.CH, SP.CH, INT.CH (C.I.B.), FCI A2O CH), must have been awarded after the implementation date.

42.1.7.4. The Federal Council or Executive Committee shall issue a “Sire of Merit (SOM)” or “Dam of Merit (DOM)” Award Certificate, as the case may be, to the Registered Owner(s) of every dog qualifying for such an Award under the provisions of Schedule 03 Regulation 42 and any relevant Schedule of Regulations forming part of the KUSA Constitution.

For approval.

NdP said that, as had been mooted by the representative of the SA Bull Terrier Club at the DOGSPC meeting where this proposal had been discussed, he also still held the view that

		<p>these titles should only be bestowed on dogs that had tested clear of certain breed-specific inherited diseases. However, he had taken cognisance of the fact that it was not possible for the KUSA Office to administer such a requirement at present and was therefore prepared to support this proposal in the hope and expectation that the criteria might be reviewed in future to include mandatory health testing for breeds that so decide.</p> <p>NR agreed and said that, once the KUSA Office had a policy and procedure in place for the representatives of the individual breeds to nominate the breeds' health test requirements and the acceptable results for such tests, and the majority of breeds had provided such health test requirements, the matter could be reconsidered by Fedco with a view to making the SOM and DOM titles subject to breed-specific health testing. That was, however, a long way down the line and, in the meantime, there was no need to delay the introduction of the two titles.</p> <p>On a proposal from NR, seconded by DS, the proposed amendments to Schedule 03 Regulation 42.1 were approved, unanimously.</p> <p>Effective 01.03.2025.</p> <p>[Note: NR informed Fedco that, although implied, the above proposal did not specifically take account of, for instance the Champion status of dogs imported from foreign countries which is added to their registered names when they are re-registered with KUSA. Accommodating committee members or sponsors who need to balance work and show commitments; 5. Facilitating exhibitors in order to attract more entries; and 6. Supporting Specialist Clubs hosting Shows on the same day. <p>This new restriction complicates the organisation of Cluster weekends, where multiple Shows are held concurrently. For example, the SA Dachshund Club and Free State Bulldog Club, that have historically run their Shows alongside Jacaranda City Kennel Club and</p>

Bloemfontein & Northern Free State Kennel Clubs, respectively, will no longer be able to adjust the judging order to accommodate both events in each instance. This could hinder growth in an already challenging environment and potentially result in fewer entries.

The rule also contradicts one of the core objectives outlined in the KUSA Articles defining Clubs: "The objects of which include the **welfare of**, interest in, and breeding of **all recognised Breeds of purebred dogs**, with a primary focus on providing Championship and other Shows." By preventing 'weather-vulnerable' Breeds from being judged at more appropriate times, the welfare of these animals is being compromised.

The option of pre-applying to Exco for dispensation to deviate from the default order of judging, as mooted at the FDF – Session 2, would not be feasible, as it would introduce unnecessary bureaucracy. Clubs would need to submit formal requests to Exco, which would then be added to the Exco Agenda for consideration. The decision-making process could take up to two months, putting additional pressure on Clubs already managing tight timelines for planning their events, finalising judging panels, and submitting Show Schedules to KUSA for approval, thereby also burdening the KUSA Office with extra procedures and timelines.

The text under ORDER OF BREED JUDGING was intensely debated over a number of FDF Sessions, where it was acknowledged that there was no valid reason for dispensing with the stating of the default order of judging in Regulations 1.1 & 1.2, and that there was also no reason for discarding Regulations 1.3 & 1.4, as these provided further clarity to Clubs. To avoid possible misunderstandings between host Clubs and Specialist/Groups Clubs holding their Shows on the same day and at the same venue about starting times and possible suspension of judging, there was strong support for a further Regulation to be included providing for Letters of Agreement between the host Club and Clubs holding the Shows in tandem with the host Club, such Regulation to be inserted as a new Regulation 2.

The above ultimately led to the following re-draft, amending the text of the proposal as indicated in **red**:

ORDER OF BREED JUDGING

1. **Breeds shall, by default, be judged in the order as listed in Schedule 02 Appendix "A1".** In the case of:
 - 1.1. A full Group allocated to a single Judge, the breeds will be judged in the order they are listed in Schedule 02 Appendix "A1", **unless varied by the Club with good cause and the revised judging order is published in the Official accepted Show Schedule;**

2. **Should the change in judging order in Regulations 1.1 and 1.2 above be necessitated or prompted by the accommodation of the judging order or starting times of Specialist Clubs or Group Clubs holding their Shows on the same day and at the same venue, the host Club shall ensure that all arrangements with Specialist Clubs or Group Clubs pertaining to the order of judging, starting times, and any foreseeable possible suspensions of judging due to clashes, are properly formalised in Letters of Agreement between the host Club and the Clubs holding their Shows in tandem with the Show of the host Club, which shall be submitted together with the draft Show Schedule to the KUSA office for audit and acceptance.**

		12.6.1	<p>Report by the Field Trial Liaison Council Chairman</p> <p>Field Trial Liaison Council – 2024 Annual Report Chairman: Dr Alan Kloeck</p> <p>2024 continued to be a challenging year for the field trialling community, however, there was significant activity and positive development especially in the Shooting Ratings, Gundog Hunting Tests and Versatile Hunting Tests fraternities. For the first time in South Africa, the top tests for the Shooting Ratings and the Gundog Hunting Tests were run. Four</p>

			<p>dogs were successful in the Shooting Dog Excellent Test, and three passed the Retrieving Dog Excellent. In the VGP Test – Schedule 05C(5) – three dogs passed, judged by visiting German Judges.</p> <p>The majority of disciplines were successful in holding well-attended field trials and tests across the country. On the upside, a total of 409 dogs ran in Retriever Trials, 52 in Spaniel Trials, 13 dogs ran in the Natural Ability Test, 70 in Shooting Ratings, 7 in Versatile Hunting Tests for Pointing Breeds and 8 in Gundog Hunting Tests.</p> <p>A number of retriever clubs and versatile breed clubs also managed to hold Working Tests and workshops during the season, which enabled dogs and handlers to get some extra training and trial experience.</p> <p>The 2024 KUSA National Retriever Championship Field Trial was held at St Fort in Clarens and was successfully hosted by the joint committees of the Working Retriever Club and the Gundog Club. This prestigious event was exceptionally well run by the joint team and had 14 entrants invited to run. It proved to be an excellent spectator competition with five dogs finishing the Championship Stake, (held over two days,) with all five achieving SAHRA points (above 70%). It was won by the Golden Retriever “Rookie”, Gospelash Highlander of Chardale, owned by Charles Trollope.</p> <p>Despite the FTLC’s best endeavours to continue its initiative to focus on improving judging skills in all disciplines and of trying to attract new Judges to the sport, this continues to be hampered by a lack of new members to the sport. We, however, managed to provide ample exposure to a number of relatively new Hunt test, Retriever, and Spaniel field trial Judges to gain experience over all the stakes during the course of the year.</p> <p>A number of tests under Schedule 05(C)5 and Schedule 05(C)6 were offered by the WDDC and Cape clubs and a Shooting Ratings Workshop was presented in the Cape, all proving very successful.</p> <p>The WDDC, WWC and WDKC also planned a training and Judges’ seminar in order to improve both judging skills/interpretation as well as training skills in these disciplines and aligned with the visit of guest German Hunting test Judges in the latter half of the season. The FTLC had new copies of all the updated Schedule 05(C) regulations printed for all disciplines and provided these to all participants and officials in the various disciplines. A proposed field trial calendar has been set for 2025, with a total of 27 events proposed, which we hope to see rolled out as the new season breaks. 	14.3.1	<p>Report from the KUSA Office</p> <p>KUSA Trick Dog Annual Report 2024</p> <p>Following implementation on 01.02.2024, Trick Dog has grown in leaps and bounds. To date a total of 1,103 level titles (excluding Specialities) have been awarded to 574 dogs. A total of 70 different breeds have participated in Trick Dog as well as a wide range of mixed-breeds or breed-types. Of the 336 handlers that participated, 42.9% are KUSA members.</p> <p>Trick Dog currently has 12 Evaluators, all of whom deserve a special thank you for giving up their time to evaluate, encourage, coach and motivate participants.</p> <p>Approximately 25 demos have been given as well as several workshops. All have been well attended. This included the two PetExpo events and the Eastern Districts Kennel Club Handlers Camp in 2024.</p> <p>Trick Dog regularly gets feedback complimenting the programme on its inclusivity (for rescue dogs, special needs dogs and people living outside major centres). Furthermore, many favourable comments are received about the enhancement of the relationship between the owner/handler and dog, increased confidence and improved performance.</p> <p>The structure of Trick Dog has been adapted by several training schools for their classes to work through as it has been designed in a way that each step lays the foundation for the next step.</p> <p>In addition to the titling levels, Specialities are run on occasion and for a limited time period. These speak to dogs that have completed all the levels, those not ready for the next level or those unable to progress further (i.e. due to age). To date six Specialities have been run, each speaking to a specific theme (e.g. Valentines, Happy Holidays, Halloween etc.). Participants are required to do a specified number of tricks speaking to the theme. A total of 166 dogs have participated in these events.</p> <p>A total of 45 dogs have achieved the Champion title and, although this may sound like a lot, a number of them had achieved Trick Dog Champion through the US-based Do More With Your Dog and then moved across to KUSA to get their title officially recognised. As expected, the number of submissions for Champion has slowed down, but submissions are still received on a regular basis.</p> <p>Some exciting events are planned for 2025 and we look forward to seeing further growth and development in Trick Dog.</p> <p>For noting.</p> <p>PM alerted Fedco to the exponential growth of Trick Dog within a short period and Fedco congratulated all involved on the tremendous strides made in popularising Trick Dog as a worthy and viable Companion Event under KUSA.</p> <p>The Report compiled by the KUSA Office on Trick Dog was noted by Fedco with interest and sincere appreciation.</p>

To do this, the JEC had to investigate the synergies between the KUSA 7-Group classification of breeds and the FCI's 10-Group classification, while taking account of the so-called FCI Key Groups 1, 2, 3, 5, & 9. The alignment of these two diverse groupings, to the utmost extent possible, is of critical importance for the acceptance of KUSA Judges as eminently qualified to officiate in FCI countries.</p>

2. LEVELS OF PROGRESSION

There are six (6) levels of progression in the Learning Programme.

2.2. LEVEL 2: LEARNER JUDGE

2.2.1. **Foundation Phase:** On the successful completion of Level 1, a Learner Judge may register to study only one Group or a single breed at Specialist Level, and work through the modules in Level 2.

2.2.2. **Advanced Phase:** On the successful completion of the Foundation Phase, a Learner Judge may study up to two (2) courses simultaneously, **provided that they are not regulated by the FCI as one of the FCI Key Groups** (e.g. two (2) Group Courses **(which excludes any FCI Key Group)**; or one (1) Group Course, **which may be an FCI Key Group (Key Group 9 excluded)** plus the Breed Specialisation Course; or one (1) Group Course, **which may be an FCI Key Group (Key Group 9 excluded)** plus the Junior Showmanship Course) – taking on an additional course of study only once the previous Level 2 examination has been passed.

2.3. LEVEL 3: PROVISIONAL JUDGE

2.3.1. On the successful completion of Paper 2: Group Course, or the Junior Showmanship, or Breed Specialisation examinations, the KUSA Office will acknowledge the Learner Judge as a Provisional Judge until the requirements for Level 3 have been met (*See Appendix 1, 2, or 3 for relevant criteria*).

2.3.2. A Provisional Judge is permitted to judge at Non-championship or Qualifying Shows and may award Challenge Certificates (CCs) at Championship Shows in

the Group or Specialist Breed for which he/she has passed the examination, subject to required time restrictions (See Reg. 3).

2.4. LEVEL 4: LICENSED JUDGE

2.4.1. On the successful completion of the requirements of Level 3, the KUSA Office will acknowledge the Provisional Judge as a Licensed Judge.

2.4.2. A Licensed Judge is permitted to judge at Non-championship or Qualifying Shows and may award Challenge Certificates (CCs) at Championship Shows in the Group(s) or Specialist Breed for which he/she has gained licence(s), subject to required time restrictions (See Reg. 3).

2.4.3. Licensed Judges are requested to volunteer their services, whenever possible, at Non-championship Shows in order to assist Club Organisers in the filling of roles and also to keep in good practice.

2.4.4. A Licensed Judge may accept appointments outside of South Africa and Namibia.

2.4.5. A Licensed Judge is qualified to award the FCI 'Certificat d'aptitude au Championnat International de Beauté' (FCI-C.A.C.I.B.®) to breeds within the qualified Group(s) at South African-hosted FCI International Shows only, until a period of two (2) years has passed from the date of the qualifying examination[;whereafter a Licensed Judge may accept invitations to award FCI C.A.C.I.B.®s to breeds within the qualified Group(s) at FCI International Shows outside of South Africa].

2.4.5.1. During this two (2) year period, a KUSA Licensed Judge who has opted to do one Group Course only, will be allowed to apply through the KUSA Office, to embark on further educational studies to become compliant with the FCI Regulations for those breeds which form part of the FCI Group, but do not form part of the KUSA Group as per Schedule 02 Appendix "A1" and Appendix "A2". Having successfully applied and completed the educational studies as referred to under Regulations 2.3.1.9, 2.3.6.5, 2.3.7 & 4.1.5.1 of Schedule 10 Appendix 1 – Group Course, the Licensed Judge may accept invitations to award FCI-C.A.C.I.B.®s to breeds within the qualified Group(s) at FCI International Shows outside of South Africa.

2.4.6. If the Licensed Judge has an interest in guiding future Judges, he/she may apply to follow the KUSA Assessor's Course to allow him/her to serve as an Assessor or Mentor for that Group or breed.

For approval.

Discussion ensued, during which several questions were posed to the two Representatives of the JEC. The responses from the Chairman and Vice-Chairman of the JEC appeared to adequately obviate any doubt that the JEC's proposal posed the most feasible solution to the problem of South African Judges attaining FCI international judging status under the misaligned KUSA and FCI groupings. The Chairman implored Fedco to support the JEC's efforts to align the two groupings in the most sensible and innovative manner possible to achieve the desired outcome of not only continuing to qualify local Judges under the KUSA Breed Judges' Learning Programme (KBJLP), but also to achieve adherence to FCI Regulations by guiding Learner Judges to follow properly structured study paths as a means of effectively and efficiently progressing through the KBJLP.

			<p>GR reminded Fedco that navigation between the two groupings to advise Learners of the most practicable means to an end was fraught with complexities. It was, however, the task of the JEC to find the often-elusive middle ground along which to guide those aspiring to become licensed FCI Judges. The amendments to Schedule 10 and its Appendices aim to chart the most rational course as currently anticipated, but should not be taken as etched in stone. The application of the new Regulations should soon prove their efficacy and relevance and it was, of course, eminently possible that further amendments would be required to fill lacunae and fine-tune the text to improve clarity.</p> <p>On a proposal from MV, seconded by NR, the proposed amendments to Schedule 10 were approved, unanimously.</p> <p>Effective 01.03.2025, but may be implemented on publication of these Minutes.</p>
		15.3.1	<p>Schedule 10 Appendix 1 – Group Course</p> <p>Proposed amendments to Schedule 10 Appendix 1</p> <p>Submitted by the Northern Areas Provincial Council.</p> <p>Proposal: To remove the requirement for Learner Judges to officiate out-of-province at one or more Non-championship Shows.</p> <p>Motivation: As a pre-requisite for qualifying as a KUSA Breed Judge, all Learner Judges must judge at least one Show for the Group qualification out-of-province. The rationale for this requirement is for Learner Judges to gain practical experience in the multi-skilled task of judging at conformation Shows. In the past this was appropriate and helped in achieving the intended objective due to the number of exhibitors attending these events.</p> <p>In recent years, however, there has been a significant decrease in the number of exhibitors attending these events for various reasons, but, as a result, the intended objective of the requirements has been significantly impacted.</p> <p>Previously, Learner Judges could expect to evaluate several exhibits at almost every Show, therefore the experience gained from having to officiate at out-of-province Shows was both beneficial and justified. In the current climate there are much fewer exhibitors than in the past and it has occurred on multiple occasions that only one specimen is exhibited at a Show. It is not unexpected nowadays to find the same exhibitors attending Shows and more so only attending Non-championship Shows to make up the qualification of a new exhibit and thereafter only attending Championship Shows which further leads to the reduced number of exhibitors at Non-championship events.</p> <p>This potentially places an enormous amount of pressure on Learner Judges, since they may accept a judging appointment out-of-province where there are no, or an insignificant number, of exhibits to evaluate while at the same time not offering sufficient experience to the candidate. It is near impossible to justify the costs of travel, meals and accommodation, whether by road or air, to Learner Judges under such circumstances. In some instances, Learner Judges may even need to take a leave of absence from their employment to accept an appointment out-of-province.</p> <p>Non-Championship Shows do not typically require pre-entry, therefore the number of expected exhibits is always an unknown and the Learner Judge must accept an appointment to judge at least three months in advance in terms of KUSA Schedules. This</p>

collectively results in the balance of probabilities being disproportionately unfavourable for the Learner Judge.

In recent times, many Breeds and Clubs have been holding Breed- and Group-specific workshops for interested parties such as Learner Judges where exhibitors bring their dogs to the workshop for display and discussion by specialists of the Breed. This potentially has far more value for Learner Judges than the current out-of-province requirements and could be considered as a substitution of the out-of-province requirement in the Breed Judges' Learning Programme.

2.3.3. Judging Appointments

2.3.3.2. The Learner Judge will need to judge:

- a) at least eight (8)* different breeds in the chosen Group
- b) at least sixty (60)** exhibits
- c) at a minimum of three (3) Non-championship Shows, at least two (2) of which must cover the whole Group, subject to Regulation~~s 2.3.3.4 and 2.3.3.8~~ **2.3.3.7**, below.

~~[2.3.3.4. At least one (1) of the judging appointments must be in a different geographical Centre from the one in which the Learner Judge is based; more if possible]~~

3. LEVEL 3: PROVISIONAL JUDGE

3.1.3. The Provisional Judge will be required to judge a minimum of eight (8)* breeds during at least ~~{one (1)}~~ **two (2) Championship Show appointments and for a Bull Terrier Breed Specialist Judge a requirement to judge at least three (3) Championship Speciality Show appointments.**

For approval of the relevant part of the proposal.

NdP agreed that the amendment to Schedule 10 Appendix 1 Regulation 3.1.3 had been misplaced, as it had indeed been envisaged for the Breed Specialisation Course (Schedule 10 Appendix 3).

Regarding the removal of the requirement for Learner Judges to officiate at a minimum of one out-of-Centre ("geographical Centre" being the same as geographical Province) appointment, JH informed Fedco that the JEC had considered this proposal at its most recent meeting and believed that it should be part of a wider discussion on the restructuring of the KUSA Breed Judges' Learning Programme (KBJLP). As a result, she appealed to Fedco to grant the JEC the latitude to consider this proposal along with other proposals from the Council members with a view to adjusting the JEC's requirements to take account of current realities, rather than the prevailing ones at the time of the JEC's founding. Making piecemeal amendments at this stage was not considered by the JEC to be the desired

			<p>strategy. MV supported JH's appeal and said that the JEC should be able to revert to Fedco with its proposed amendment to the KBJLP by Fedco 06-2025.</p> <p>Since the proposal had emanated from the NAPC, NdP expressed his amenability to affording the JEC the necessary time to bring its envisaged proposal for the restructuring of the KBJLP to the table at a future Fedco meeting. JH thanked NdP for his understanding and hoped that the JEC would also be able to rely on the support of the other members of Fedco to entrust this matter to the discretion and judgement of the JEC.</p> <p>MV assured Fedco of the JEC's intention to create a new experience for Learner Judges under the revised KBJLP by closely aligning the Programme with the judges' education methods recommended by the FCI and applied in other FCI countries. 1.4. REQUIREMENTS

1.4.1. Course Introduction

1.4.1.1. The Candidate Judge shall participate in a Course Introduction – a presentation delivered as a virtual webinar presented nationally, initiated and arranged by the JEC Resources Officer on a specified date, or as an actual seminar **or an online webinar** presented to local attendees in a provincial area.

1.4.1.2. Determined by the intake of Candidate Judges, the Course Introduction will be offered up to twice a year as a requirement for Candidate Judges to obtain examination entrance for Paper 1.

2. LEVEL 2: LEARNER JUDGE

2.1. STUDY PHASES

2.1.1. Foundation Phase:

On a Learner Judge's first entry to Level 2, only one course may be studied. (See 1.5.9.)

2.1.2. Advanced Phase:

2.1.2.1. On the successful completion of the Foundation Phase, a Learner Judge may study up to two (2) courses simultaneously, choosing any of the following:

- a) two Group Courses, **provided that they are not regulated by the FCI as one of the FCI Key Groups**
- b) the Junior Showmanship Course in combination with a Breed Specialisation Course
- c) any Group Course in combination with either a Junior Showmanship Course or a Breed Specialisation Course

2.1.2.2. A Learner Judge may take on an additional course of study as contemplated in 2.1.2.1 above only once the previous Level 2 examination has been passed, subject to the exception permitted in 2.1.2.3 below.

2.1.2.3. Notwithstanding the provisions of 2.1.2.1, if the additional course undertaken is not the Junior Showmanship Course, the Learner Judge shall be permitted to supplement his chosen two (2) courses, **provided that they are not regulated by the FCI as one of the Key Groups,** with the Junior Showmanship Course.

2.1.2.4. The Learner Judge will need to pace his/her studies to sit the final examination of each course consecutively or over greater periods since there is no allowance for a Learner Judge to sit two course examinations simultaneously during any examination session (June or November).

2.3. MODULES

2.3.1. Breed Tests

The rationale for this module is to cultivate familiarity with the location and content of the most current Breed Standards and to ensure a thorough understanding of the relevant breeds before entering the ring to judge them

2.3.1.1. The Learner Judge completes fifteen (15)* Breed Tests of the currently popular breeds in a Group.

2.3.1.2. The JEC Assessment Officer will forward these Breed Tests to the Learner Judge. Once completed, the Learner Judge will submit the Breed Tests to the assigned Mentor who will be responsible for assessing them.

2.3.1.3. The Breed Tests comprise questions on elements of the relevant Breed Standards. Learner Judges must consult the current Breed Standards – available on the KUSA website – in order to answer the questions correctly (www.kusa.co.za/index.php/documents/breed-standards).

2.3.1.4. The pass mark for the Breed Test is 100%.

2.3.1.5. If initially unsuccessful, Learner Judges will have the opportunity to revise or redo the Breed Tests until a successful pass mark is attained.

2.3.1.6. Once approved by the assigned Mentor, the fifteen (15)*Breed Tests must be stored in the Portfolio.

2.3.1.7. The assigned Mentor will notify the JEC Assessment Officer of the successful completion of the Breed Tests, who will, in turn, coordinate the Learner's credits and progress with the KUSA Judges' Department.

2.3.1.8. A Learner Judge will not be cleared to progress further until all fifteen (15)* compulsory Breed Tests have been successfully completed.

2.3.1.9 FCI compliance: In accordance with the provisions of a Level 4 Licensed Judge, as per Regulation 4.1.5.1 below, the successful applicant will be required to submit Breed Tests for those FCI Breeds within an FCI Group, which form part of the FCI Group, but do not form part of the KUSA Group.

2.3.1.9.1 The Licensed Judge completes Breed Tests for the FCI-listed breeds which are not part of the particular KUSA Group.

2.3.1.9.2. The JEC Assessment Officer will forward these Breed Tests to the Licensed Judge. Once completed, the Licensed Judge will submit the Breed Tests to the assigned Mentor who will be responsible for assessing them.

2.3.1.9.3. The Breed Tests comprise questions on elements of the relevant FCI Breed Standards. The Licensed Judge must consult the current FCI Breed Standards in order to answer the questions correctly – available on the FCI website under FCI Breeds Nomenclature.

2.3.1.9.4. The pass mark for the Breed Test is 100%.

2.3.1.9.5. If initially unsuccessful, the Licensed Judge will have the opportunity to revise or resubmit the Breed Tests until the required pass mark has been achieved.

2.3.1.9.6. Once approved by the assigned Mentor, the assigned Mentor will notify the JEC Assessment Officer of the successful completion of the Breed Tests who will, in turn, coordinate the Learner's credits and progress with the KUSA Judges' Department.

2.3.1.9.7. The Licensed Judge will not be cleared to progress further until all the required FCI Breed Tests have been successfully completed.

*(*Note: For purposes of calculating the number of breeds for quota requirements, one breed, regardless of varieties within that breed **accommodated in a single Breed Standard**, counts as one breed. **Breed-varieties with separate Breed Standards count as different breeds.**)*

2.3.3 Judging Appointments

The rationale for this module is to gain practical experience in the multi-skilled task of judging at Conformation Shows. The writing of brief reports encourages the finding of sound reasons for judging decisions and promotes a culture of positive judging.

2.3.3.1 The Learner Judge may accept and will be cleared for judging appointments on the successful completion of the Breed Tests and Breed Hallmarks Assignment. (See Regs. 2.3.1. and 2.3.2.) The acceptance of judging appointments when ineligible to do so on account of non-compliance with the Regulations, shall be deemed as ~~willful~~**wilful** misrepresentation of judging qualifications and be subject to an appropriate penalty to be imposed by the Executive Committee.

2.3.6. Learning Encounters

The rationale for this module is to open the Learner Judge to a number of different learning opportunities that may offer various views of and insights into the breeds being studied in order to form balanced and supplementary knowledge of these breeds and also to inculcate a culture of life-long learning.

2.3.6.1. The Learner Judge must attend or participate in a minimum of ten (10) Learning Encounters, of which:

- a) three (3) JEC Breed Seminars/Workshops/Webinars are compulsory, and
- b) the balance of at least seven (7) Learning Encounters may comprise any or all of the following:
 - additional breed seminars/workshops/webinars
 - privately viewed breed presentations/webcasts
 - private breed discussions
 - clinics (e.g. Breed Hallmarks of several/all breeds in a Group)
 - study groups (e.g. several Learner Judges working a study together)
 - grooming workshops/demonstrations
 - Shadow Judging at Non-championship Shows (same procedure as Shadow Judging at Championship Shows – refer to Reg 2.3.4. above)

2.3.6.2. The Learner Judge must record full details of place, presenter, date, references and proof of attendance on standardised forms to be stored in the Portfolio.

2.3.6.3. All Learning Encounters – whether private or public – must be summarised and analysed in sufficient detail and with satisfactory insight. Failure to meet sufficient analytical detail may result in a Learning Encounter not being credited.

2.3.6.4. Credit will be given for previously attended Seminars covering the Group or breed being studied, providing proof of attendance is provided.

2.3.6.5. FCI compliance: In accordance with the provisions for a Level 4 Licensed Judge as per Regulation 4.1.5.1 below, the successful applicant will be required to submit one of the following Learning Encounters for each of the FCI-listed breeds which are *not* part of the particular KUSA Group:

- additional breed seminars/workshops/webinars
- privately viewed breed presentations/webcasts

2.3.6.5.1. On the successful completion of the Learning Encounter, the Licensed Judge must record full details of place, presenter, date, references and proof of attendance (if available) on standardised forms to be submitted to the JEC Assessment Officer

who will, in turn, coordinate the Learner's credits and progress with the KUSA Judges' Department.

2.3.6.5.2. The Licensed Judge will not be cleared to progress further until the required Learning Encounters have been successfully completed.

2.3.7. Practical Hands-on Judging Test

This Regulation applies only to those Licensed Judges who have opted to study a *single Group* in accordance with Schedule 10, KUSA Breed Judges' Learning Programme as set out in Regulation 2.4.5.1 and according to the same Regulation as specified in Regulation 4.1.5.1 below.

2.3.7.1. Under the supervision of two (2) qualified KUSA Judges with a minimum of five (5) years' experience, the Licensed Judge will undergo a Hands-on Practical Test on a minimum of four (4) breeds listed in Schedule 02 Appendix "A2", fulfilling the following requirements:

- A verbal commentary on the examination of each breed
- Placement of the breeds in the Group from 1st to 4th, explaining the reasons for the position of each placement.

2.3.7.2. It is the responsibility of the Licensed Judge to notify the KUSA Judges' Department when ready to undertake the Hands-on Practical Test as specified in 2.3.7.1 above. The KUSA Judges' Department will liaise with the Judges Education Council Assessment Officer, who will coordinate the setting up of this Practical Test.

4. LEVEL 4: LICENSED JUDGE

4.1. PROVISIONS OF THIS LEVEL

4.1.1. On the successful completion of the requirements of Level 3, the KUSA Office will acknowledge the Provisional Judge as a Licensed Judge.

4.1.2. A Licensed Judge is permitted to judge at Non-championship or Qualifying Shows and may award Challenge Certificates (CCs) at Championship Shows in the Group(s) for which he/she has gained licence(s), subject to required time restrictions (*See Schedule 10, Reg. 3.*)

4.1.3. Licensed Judges are requested to volunteer their services, whenever possible, at Non-championship Shows in order to assist Club Organisers in the filling of roles and also to keep in good practice.

4.1.4. A Licensed Judge may accept appointments outside of South Africa and Namibia.

4.1.5. A Licensed Judge is qualified to award FCI '*Certificat d'aptitude au Championnat International de Beauté*' (FCI-C.A.C.I.B.®) to breeds within the qualified Group(s) at South African-hosted FCI International Shows only, until a period of two (2) years has passed from the date of the qualifying examination[whereafter a Licensed Judge may accept invitations to award FCI-C.A.C.I.B.®s to breeds within the qualified Group(s) at FCI International Shows outside of South Africa].

4.1.5.1. During this two (2) year period:

4.1.5.1.1. A Licensed Judge who has opted to do a *single Group Course* only, will be allowed to apply through the KUSA Office, to embark on further educational studies, to become compliant with the FCI Regulations for those breeds which form part of the FCI Group, but do *not* form part of the KUSA

			<p><u>Group. Having successfully applied and completed the educational studies as referred to under Regulations 2.3.1.9, 2.3.6.5 & 2.3.7 above, the Judge may accept invitations to award FCI-C.A.C.I.B.®s to breeds within the qualified Group(s) at FCI International Shows outside of South Africa.</u></p> <p>4.1.6. If the Licensed Judge has an interest in guiding future Judges, he/she may apply to follow the KUSA Assessor's Course to allow him/her to serve as an Assessor or Mentor for that Group.</p> <p>For approval.</p> <p>It was noted that the comments and caveats raised under Item 15.3 applied <i>mutatis mutandis</i> to this item and, on a proposal from MV, seconded by NR, the proposed amendments to Schedule 10 Appendix 1 were approved, unanimously.</p> <p>Effective 01.03.2025, but may be implemented on publication of these Minutes.</p>

[Note: The above amendments to Regulation 8 of Schedule 10 Appendix 3 were assessed by the JEC, which reserved judgment on universally increasing the number of Breed Speciality Shows to be judged by all Breed Specialisation Judges from one (1) to two (2). Although this quantum is easily achievable by Bull Terrier Specialisation Judges due to the numerous Bull Terrier Speciality Shows on offer throughout any year, the same does not apply to Rottweiler and German Shepherd Dog Specialisation Judges, the other two breeds for which Breed Specialisation courses have been developed so far. There were precious few judging opportunities at Breed Speciality Shows for Rottweiler and German Shepherd Dog Specialisation Judges.

In consequence, the JEC recommended a re-draft of the proposed amendments to Regulation 8 to permit the various Specialisation Breeds to set their own quota of Breed Specialty Shows to be judged by Provisional Judges in order to achieve Licensed Judge status. This may be accomplished by setting the numbers of *additional* (i.e. over and above the first such appointment) Breed Specialty Shows for the individual Specialisation Breeds.

In the above proposal submitted by the NAPC, it is envisaged that a Bull Terrier Specialisation Judge should fill three (3) (2 + 1) Breed Speciality Show appointments to qualify as a Licensed Judge. In line with the JEC's proposal, it is recommended that this outcome is regulated on a 1 + 2 (3) basis, as follows:]

8. FINAL ASSESSMENT

8.3 The Provisional Breed Specialist Judge will be required to judge at least one (1) Championship Speciality Show appointment and such additional Championship Speciality Show appointments as may be set for the individual breeds for which Breed Specialisation Courses are offered under KUSA Breed Judges' Learning Programme. The breed(s) for which Provisional Breed Specialisation Judges would be required to fulfil additional (more than one) Championship Speciality Show appointments are:

• Bull Terrier – Two (2) additional Championship Speciality Show appointments

8.4 The JEC reserves the right to assign a Breed Specialist Assessor to observe the Provisional Judges' performance and provide feedback on a set of criteria that the Provisional Judge must meet in order to be approved as a Licensed Judge.

8.4.1 If the assessment criteria [~~is~~are] not met, the Provisional Breed Specialist Judge will need to fill [~~a second~~] additional [8.4.2.] Championship Specialty Show appointments with the same assessment criteria as above, until the quota has been satisfied.

[Note: The reasonability of the quantum of three (3) Breed Speciality Shows for Bull Terrier Specialisation Judges, as recommended by the NAPC, is obviously subject to Fedco's consideration and approval.]

After explanation from GR, NdP expressed his satisfaction that the revised amendment to Schedule 10 Appendix 3 Regulation 8.3 achieved the desired result. He stated that the requirements for a Bull Terrier Specialist Judge should be separated from the requirements for a Recognition of Merit (ROM) Judge, eligible to judge a premium special event such as

			<p>the Bull Terrier Major Trophy Show (MTS). Apart from having three (3) Bull Terrier Speciality Show appointments under the belt, ROM status is only conferred on Bull Terrier Specialist Judges who also meet a number of other requirements. 		17.1.1	<p>Report from the Chairman of the Rottweiler Breed Council</p> <p>Rottweiler Breed Council Annual Report 2024 Chairman: Mr Neil Perkins</p> <p>I would like to begin by thanking the Council's executive members, delegates, club committees and club members for their continued efforts to maintain and improve our sport and breed.</p> <p>It is important to reflect on our achievements as a collective and ensure we maintain our focus for the future.</p> <p>We must also give thanks to Fedco for its continued support and understanding of the critical role the Breed Council plays in the development of our sport as it pertains to the Rottweiler breed. Our breed is faced with many challenges as with many other breeds and we strongly believe that this continued partnership ensures good governance and a strong foundation for the existing structures as well as those in development. I'm aware of some new proposals in the pipeline, however these still require considerable work before they can be formally proposed and voted on.</p> <p>This year, our Clubs hosted well-organised shows and trials overall, but we still see the lingering effects of Covid affecting show entries, specifically in Johannesburg and KwaZulu-Natal. It is at this time that this Council needs to consider measures to encourage a greater level of participation, both in shows and on the working field.</p> <p>This year our National Sieger Show was combined with two other Shows, one being a regional Sieger Show. This 3-day event with two International Judges, being the first of its kind, was created in an effort to create some excitement and possibly improved entries, with mixed results.</p> <p>As costs continue to rise, Clubs are forced to consider additional fund-raising efforts. For those Clubs with sponsorship deals it is critical that Clubs ensure that sponsors are getting a tangible return on investment. The days are gone where sponsors are satisfied with minimal exposure at events.</p> <p>We continue to celebrate the successes of our Specialist Judges being invited to Judge internationally and we are encouraged by two additional Judges who have recently met all requirements and have already judged their first Championship Shows. This affords Clubs a cheaper alternative and additional choice when considering a Judge for their events. We</p>

		<p>continue to encourage new Judges who meet the basic requirements to begin their journey to becoming a Judge.</p> <p>Rescue continues to be a strain on limited resources and volunteers, these individuals display intimate dedication and patience. Our thanks to Rottweilers Rescue for their tireless efforts. "Education" is constantly required to educate not only potential owners, but also breeders. This must be considered as a new portfolio on the Council together with "Breeder Liaison", which is focussed on keeping breeders engaged and informed as well as encouraging those breeders not currently registering their puppies with KUSA to become members and begin doing so.</p> <p>We are mindful of our responsibility to promote the immense working ability of our breed and constantly seek ways to grow this area. I would like to encourage the clubs to host working seminars, trials and training that displays the mental and physical ability of our working breed. Without preserving these aspects of our breed we lose the essence of the Rottweiler. At the Annual General Meeting that took place on 10 December 2023, Mr Shaun Graham was elected as the Vice-Chairman of the Breed Council. Although the office of Secretary has historically been elected from within the representatives of the Breed Council, there was no one willing to fulfil the role and it was necessary to co-opt a person other than a Breed Council representative. Mrs May Oosthuizen from Boxer Club Gold Reef was kind enough to accept the appointment as Secretary of the Breed Council shortly after the meeting was held. Mrs Diane Kee du Plessis was unanimously re-elected as the Treasurer and Mr Ken Hull agreed to continue administering the website. Mrs Karin Schoeman agreed to continue in her role as the Registration Secretary and was also unanimously re-elected.

The Pet Expo for 2024 was raised as a discussion point and after much deliberation it was agreed that the FBCSA BC would once again not participate in the event due to the inability to ensure sufficient presence during the event. The Northern Boxer Club, at the same time, confirmed that, despite the Club having a licence available during the exhibition, it would not be hosting a show at the event either. It was later announced that the Pet Expo 2024 would not be taking place at the proposed venue and these decisions therefore had no impact, although it was disappointing to see that there was not enough interest to have participated, had it taken place.

Although it was agreed that the FBCSA BC would encourage and arrange to host Breed Assessments, Breed Suitability Tests and Endurance Trials, none were held during the year and none have been planned for the remainder of 2024.

It is my opinion that the Breed Council has come to a crossroad and that, at the 2024 Annual General Meeting, the representatives are going to need to make a decision whether there is any value to the Council's affiliated Clubs being provided by the Breed Council and, if not, how this is going to be turned around.

The Western Province Boxer Club has hosted their shows planned on the KUSA Show Calendar, as did Boxer Club Gold Reef. BCGR will also be celebrating their sixtieth year of existence during October 2024. I would like to congratulate the Club and wish them a very successful event on 12 October 2024. Northern Boxer Club also hosted their traditionally February show on 23 March, which was held along with Vereeniging and Districts Kennel Club. The purpose was to try encouraging bigger numbers in entries. I would like to thank Vereeniging and Districts Kennel Club for making the opportunity available to NBC.

Puppy registrations to date have been a little lower than previous years and the demand for puppies remains higher than the availability. A concerning statistic is the increase in the number of puppy deaths prior to two weeks after birth, which has unofficially increased by approximately 88 percent.

Financially, the Breed Council is doing well with an unconfirmed balance of R72577.32 in the account. The Breed Council needs to look at how these funds can be used to contribute toward the Breed, such as hosting BA, BST and AD events and more, rather than simply growing the balance.

The January 2025 requirements for dogs to have a natural tail arose and after investigation and consultation with various stakeholders it seems that, for the immediate future, we will take a similar approach to KUSA to "wait and see" what happens. It seems that even among the Boxer enthusiasts, there is a difference of opinion. Other than that, no other significant changes, events or discussions arose at the FBCSA BC during 2024.

In closing, I would like to thank all the representatives from each of the Clubs for your contribution during the year and all the Clubs for continuing to promote the Boxer dog.
